## Tourism group brainstorms ideas to bring visitors here

If you had walked into the basement of the Mount Sunflower B and B the last week in March, you would have been bombarded with the sights and sounds of people who were excited about Kansas and what it has to offer visitors.

In order to learn more and increase cooperation, 17 tourism professionals including members of the Northwest Kansas Tourism Council, gathered for a 30-hour retreat in Sharon Springs on March 25-26. Rather than sedately sitting at tables, the tourism professionals were collaborating in groups of two, shouting answers to quizzes, talking frankly to state officials about the needs of the counties and mingling freely as they discussed ways to improve the tourism experience in Northwest Kansas.

Representing Sherman County at the retreat was Donna Price, direc-

tor of the Convention and Visitors Bureau.

The program featured Marci Penner and WenDee LaPlant of the Kansas Sampler Foundation, who led the group in brainstorming and then led a trek across Wallace County with her "Kansas Explorer's Club."

Also leading sessions was Linda Craghead, the assistant secretary of the Kansas Wildlife, Parks and Tourism Department and the acting head of Tourism for Kansas. A running theme of the event was the opportunities to encourage visitors to the area.

The Northwest Kansas Tourism Council is comprised of 18 counties that cooperate in drawing visitors to the region for hunting, attractions, shopping and cultural experiences. The council works with publications such as the "Ultimate Guide to Northwest Kansas."

### Allen Delbert Pizel

Allen Delbert Pizel, 86, Lone Tree, Colo., retired Burlington area farmer, died on Saturday, March 29, 2014.

He was born on March 26, 1928, to Joseph and Esther Pizel in St. Francis. At the end of his eighth grade year he left school and started working with his older brother, Wilford J. "Bill" and father on the farm north of Burlington. In 1950 he joined the U.S. Air Force and finished his basic training in Rantoul, Ill., where he learned different types of welding. The he was stationed in Indian Springs, Nev., and Enewetak Atoll in the Marshall Islands in the South Pacific. He was a witness to the hydrogen bomb testing done in the Pacific theater.

On May 19, 1954, he and Bonnie Barber were married in Albuquerque, N.M. They made their first home at Kirkland Air Force Base in New Mexico. Mr. Pizel adopted her daughter Connie later that year. When his enlistment was done the family moved back to Colorado to resume farming. The first farmed south of Burlington at Bonnie's parents farm. They eventually moved to the Pizel farm northeast of Burlington which he managed his entire life.

Mr. Pizel loved farming and growing his crops, cattle and his grandsons. He joined the tractor pulling association and won many of those contests. His favorite tractors were the Farmall Super WD9 (the first tractor he bought new) and the John Deere R that he called

"Puppy Power." Mr. Pizel enjoyed farm and tractor shows and went to several over the years in Illinois, Minnesota and Arizona. In 1984, he and his wife went to Australia and New Zealand and in 1987 to Alaska. In the late 80s the couple became snow bird in Arizona. He would always return home when the wheat would start to green up.

He fell ill in Arizona in late February and wanted to return to Colorado. His daughter Donna brought him back to Denver for medical treatment. He was advised to have surgery and eventually succumbed to complications from that surgery.

Preceding him in death were wife of 56 years, his parents, his brother Wilford J. "Bill" Pizel and infant son Allen Junior December 1956.

Survivors include his son Mike Pizel of Lakewood, Colo.; two daughters, Donna (Ralph) Gorton of Centennial, Colo. and Connie (Fred) Niles of Brighton, Colo.; and four grandsons.

# V-2 part of exhibit in Cosmosphere

Locked in the grips of World War II, mankind was introduced to the power of the rocket during one of the most destructive eras in the history of civilization. Hitler's Germany nearly brought the world to its knees with the introduction of the V-2 late in the war. The technology was revolutionary and the purpose was simple – world domination. April 11, 2014, a new temporary exhibit opens in the Cosmosphere's Rotunda. The exhibit, "If Not for

D-Day, Doomsday: The Potential Impact of the V-2 Rocket" explores the potentially devastating effect the V-2 rocket could have had to the outcome of World War II, had it garnered enough support from Germany during its initial development. The exhibit will be on display through June 15, and features informational panels and highlights artifacts from the Cosmosphere's collection that are not on display in the Hall of Space Museum. High-

lighted artifacts include a V-2 model, rocket head "igniter" and metal skin restored by SpaceWorks. The exhibit opening is the first in a series of events leading up to the D-Day 70th Anniversary Tribute at the Cosmosphere. # Weavings, baskets on display at Logan

The exhibit at the Dane G. Hansen Museum, Logan, will be "Earth and Loom: A Century of Native American Art" will open May 16 and run through July 13.

The exhibit will consist of 20 Navajo weavings dated from the late 19th Century to contemporary. They represent different regions and weaving styles over the past century. Also on display are 26 pieces of pueblo pottery represent-

ing the work of many significant Native American potters from nine different pueblos. The pottery also dates from the late 19th century to contemporary.

The exhibit is the private collection of Dennis and Carola Deschner of Phillipsburg. They started collecting nearly 30 years ago by accident when they bought a Navajo weaving in Colorado. The couple continued to find pieces as they trav-

# Good nutrition is vital to maintain one's health

This is a perfect time for seniors, and their loved ones, to learn more about healthy foods, improve their diets and, if necessary, reach out for help.

Fortunately, making healthy food choices just got a little easier. The Food and Drug Administration has updated the Nutrition Facts label on packaged foods for the first time in 20 years. This is good news for Americans 68 and over who rely on these labels more than any other age group, with about 57 percent reading nutrition labels all or most of the time when shopping.

For seniors, good nutrition is important for maintaining a healthy immune system and avoiding chronic health problems, such as Type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease, stroke and bone loss.

Unfortunately, some seniors lose interest in eating because their senses of taste or smell have

changed, they have difficulty chewing or digesting, or they are taking medications that inhibit their appetites. Others may eschew nutritious foods like fruits and vegetables in favor of processed or pre-packaged convenience foods — or skip meals all together — because they live alone and don't see the point in cooking for one or find it difficult to prepare a home-cooked meal. According to the U.S. Administration on Aging, nearly 30 percent of non-institutionalized seniors live alone, and almost half of women over 75 live alone.

In addition, seniors may lack the mobility, transportation or financial resources to shop for healthy foods. In fact, nearly one in eight Kansas adults 60 and over lack consistent access to adequate food, according to United Health Foundation's 2013 America's Health Rankings Senior Report.

Thankfully, help is available. Seniors with low or fixed incomes may qualify for federal programs,

such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the Commodity Supplemental Food Program or the Emergency Food Assistance Program, that provide financial assistance for food. Some state and local agencies may provide meal delivery services or transportation to people who have difficulty getting to the grocery store.

For more information about nutrition assistance programs in your community, contact the Eldercare Locator, a service of the Administration on Aging, at 1-800-677-1116.

Remember, although it's not always easy, getting proper nutrition is important to staying physically and mentally healthy as we get older. Please take some time to consider how you or an older loved one might be able to get better nutrition and stay healthy and active at any age.

Nobody was rich but everybody was very busy trying to take care of their families. This was all back before food stamps and other current government programs became popular. There is no question that people in our area of Appalachia had struggles but people had a hunger and a desire to survive.

I watched the movie Coal Miner's Daughter long before I went to Van Lear to see Loretta Lynn's old home place. Sure enough it's up a "holler." However, in many ways it's a beautiful place. Her brother, who at that time, was battling cancer and still running a country grocery store gave my wife and I a tour of the old home place. When touring that old house I knew there was something within Loretta Lynn and her now deceased husband Oliver "Mooney" Lynn that was greater than the conditions of poverty that engulfed the area. The innate desire to live and rise above their surroundings lifted them higher than they probably ever imagined. They first moved to Washington State to work before Loretta started having success with music that took them to Nashville. Of course, we all can't sing like Loretta Lynn. However, we can all do and be something. Much of America has lost its desire to rise above life's circumstances. We have become mired in our joblessness, poverty or stuck in a situation.

A lot of America has died. We are breathing and going through the motions. We are collecting our food stamps, government assistance and in too many cases numbing ourselves on prescription drugs. Hopelessness is widespread from Butcher Holler to every mega city house and condo throughout the United States. Sadly many suburban houses are filled with depressed, drug sedated Americans who cannot find the internal wherewithal to get up and get moving. More Americans now die from painkillers than from heroin and cocaine combined. (Mark Koba, USA Today, July 28, 2013).

I'm sure the people who lived where I was raised, on Milo road in Kentucky, had days when the dark cloud of hopelessness almost killed their spirits but I doubt it happened a lot. People were too tired. They found something to do with their minds and bodies. We didn't have computers, cell phones and social media. We had yards to mow, gardens to tend and were trying to figure out how to make a few dollars. We didn't need drugs to numb ourselves. We simply fell into bed exhausted.

An America that's not hungry for a better life and is reliant on the government and the politicians to care for us and solve all of our problems will live sadly and die tragically.

The less-experienced Grosjean kept crashing in every race at the beginning of the year, but turned it around and started driving with more confidence and finesse, getting second-place finishes as the season wound down.

son, and so far it's been a mixed bag. Grosjean and Lotus have had a horrible time. They're behind the curve in almost everything. The fact that they finished both cars in last weekend's Bahrain Grand Prix is seen as a victory. Unfortunately, even this victory was marred when their other driver Pastor Maldonado crashed into another car and flipped it end over end. Maldonado was given a penalty during the race and has to start five places down from wherever he qualifies in the next race.

Lotus will need to fight for every inch if they're going to be a factor this year - and if they're going to survive for next year. But I would be a pretty bad fan if I abandoned them when the chips are down, so I'm hanging in there.

My other team, Force India, had an impressive weekend. Hulkenberg put in a great drive and ended up in fifth place despite starting far down the grid. Their other driver Sergio Perez, who had an abysmal 2013 at McLaren, justified his hiring at Force India with a third place finish. This, apparently, is only the second podium finish in the team's history.

Force India seems to be where Lotus was last year: the underdog nipping at the heels of the front-runners. That's all right though, cause everyone likes an underdog.

And at long last my NCAA March Madness bracket is as lost as everyone else's. There was a brief moment where I allowed myself to think I might win. But I had Michigan State and Louisville in the championship, and they were both eliminated. Better luck next year.
