Fountain will soon have water

kbottrell@nwkansas.com Thanks to a summer's worth of plumbing and concrete work, the Chamber's Park Memorial Fountain will soon have water in it for the first time in years.

Though it started life as a memorial for World War I soldiers, the fountain became a memorial to Goodland resident Craig Mann, who died from cancer in 2000. His sister Joni Guyer said Mann had loved Chambers Park. The family has been maintaining the fountain ever since, and this year undertook a new project to restore it to working order.

The work began with digging up a portion of the old concrete so that Justin Carter of McClure Plumbing and Heating could redo the plumbing. Dan Knitig has now completed the concrete work, covering what was removed to get to the plumbing. Guyer said after letting the concrete cure, the family planned to scrape off any remaining paint and then repaint the fountain.

"We plan to have it going good and proper in August," she said.

The fountain was first completed in 1930. It was a project of the Round Table Club, a Goodland women's organization. The group started fund raising to create a monument in 1920, and after nine years of setting money aside, they decided on a fountain.

Police investigate dog case

Monday the Goodland Police Department and the city's contracted animal control officer were dispatched to the 1600 block of Syracuse in reference to a dog that appeared to be a neglected.

When officers arrived the found a small, lab type dog chained in the middle of a back yard. The dog did not appear to have food, water or shade. It was also emaciated and sores all about its body. The dog was seized and taken to the City Pound, where it is being treated.

An investigation is currently pending to determine what charges should be filed against the dog's owners.

The police department reminds residents that any dog owners are required to provide the animal sufficient food, shelter, water and medical treatment. All dogs living within the city limits are required to receive annual rabies shots and be registered with the city.

Police Chief Cliff Couch said "Most dogs in Goodland are fortunate enough to have caring owners and are well taken care of. If you know of an animal that is being abused or neglected, please contact the police department so that we can investigate and ensure that the animal receives the care it needs."



Helena M. Parker, 88, of Scottsbluff, Nebraska, passed away Tuesday, July 22, 2014, after failing to recover from a fall and back surgery. Interment will be in Goodland, Kansas, with a private ceremony for the family.

Helena Marie was born December 23, 1925, in Sharon Springs, Kansas, to Dorothy and Vincent Kvasnicka. Immediately after high school graduation, she challenged her father over a woman's traditional role versus that of having a professional career. Against his wishes, she enlisted in the Cadet Nurses Corps, which had recently been established during World War II as part the US Public Health Service. Helena completed her training as a cadet and registered nurse in 1947 at Asbury School of Nursing in Salina, Kansas. She served out her cadet commitment at hospitals in Kansas, eventually settling into work at the Sherman County Hospital in Goodland, Kansas. There she cared for a patient, a sailor home on leave and injured in a car accident, who would later ask for her hand in marriage.

Helena and Jerry H. Parker were married on May 7, 1950. After several moves in the Midwest due to Jerry's career with Commonwealth Theaters, they settled in Scottsbluff in 1966. A year later, Helena began work at then-West Nebraska General Hospital where her career included helping to establish the first coronary care unit and later the intensive care unit. When she left the hospital, she joined the

teaching staff at West Nebraska Community College and was as an instructor from 1977-1990 in the practical nursing program.

Helena often said her greatest joy and sense of fulfillment were the years she spent

teaching. It was not uncommon for a former student, of which there were many, to approach her with a big hug. Her students dearly loved her, and she instilled pride in their hearts for their role as an LPN.

In retirement, Helena was a passionate gardener-her vard was a favorite when it was on the garden walk. For years later, you could still catch someone stopping to take a peak over the fence because it was a "show to behold." Her membership in the Serenity Garden Club lead to the establishment of the pathway garden behind the YMCA, which is still maintained today.

Her husband Jerry preceded Helena in death in 1968. She is survived by her brother Lee Kvasnicka; her two children Jeralyn P. Finke (Fred Finke) of Seabrook Island, South Carolina; Curt D. 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



Increasing citizen involvement

How do we get more people involved in the political process? Are our state and national governments representative of what people want, or just a collection of fringe elements that can't get along.?

And would we be better off if people could vote from home? Tough questions.

Over the years, we've changed voting laws to allow people to register when they get a driver's license, known as "Motor Voter." We've relaxed things so anyone can vote early at the county clerk's office, rather than having to swear that they will be out of town or cannot get to the polls, the change from "absentee balloting" to "advance voting."

None of this has made a significant difference in voting percentages. In Decatur County, Clerk Colleen Geihsler says, out of 2,001 registered voters, she expects about 35 percent to vote in next week's primary elections and maybe 45 to vote in the non-presidential general election this fall. But she admits, she may be optimistic.

While that could change if some of the races heat up-and Gov. Sam Brownback is under heavy fire for his tax and budget cuts, which have curbed state spending for the first time in decades. That race and the Senate race, assuming Sen Pat Roberts wins the Republican primary despite a "tea-party" challenge - could bring out more voters than usual.

The trick is getting people to care. It's not always easy; many of us sit around and moan about the government - whether we think it's too conservative, too liberal or just too inactive - rather than get out and get involved.

People will respond when they think something is important-as they did in a recent school-bond election in Salina, which drew better than a 60 percent vote in a mail-in ballot. Backers conducted a thorough and thoughtful campaign to convince voters to back the issue, and they responded.

In Oberlin, however, a mail ballot on the swimming pool issue last year drew only 46 percent, and that for a hot issue that was debated for months. Of 1,172 city voters, only 539 bothered to fill out a ballot, Ms. Geihsler said.

Some think easier access will automatically increase voter totals, but the sad fact is that isn't always true. Many, perhaps most, of those who register by the "motor voter" route never bother to actually vote. It's easy to register, hard to care.

Witness the collection of nearly 20,000 Kansas voters who've registered using the "federal form" at a driver's license office but have never bothered to provide evidence of citizenship required by current Kansas law to vote in state and local elections.

Allowing mail-in ballots in candidate elections is often suggested, but won't automatically make people care enough to vote. It also opens up routes to vote fraud that don't exist today: People could control how others vote, or even vote for them, with a mail ballot, obviating the present requirement that voters show a photo ID or other documents to vote.

To make people care, you have to show them how they'll benefit from voting, and many just don't get it. For those who grew up believing the vote is both a priceless right and a sacred privilege, that's hard to understand.

But many citizens have no idea how government works or how it affects them - and no inclination to find out. That's a travesty, but one not easily corrected. - Steve Haynes

Conserve prairie chicken, preserve industry

This Spring, we received word from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services Director that the lesser prairie chicken would be listed as a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act. This is not welcome news as the listing has real consequences for a number of Kansas industries.

Oil and gas development is one Kansas industry already being impacted by the new regulations. For example, The Wichita Eagle recently reported Vess Oil Corp. has ceased drilling in western Kansas.

For Kansas farmers and ranchers like Jarvis Garetson, who farms in Haskell, Gray and Finney Counties, the lesser prairie chicken listing will increase uncertainty.

"The lesser prairie chicken listing has the potential to cause great disruptions for Kansas farmers and ranchers. A better conservation approach must be found to protect the species, while providing producers with the certainty they need to maintain and grow their operations," Garetson said.

For utility companies like the Hays-based Sunflower Electric Power Corporation, the listing is yet another federal regulatory burden that will result in higher prices for consumers.

"Complying with this listing increases costs and limits our flexibility for routing and constructing electric lines," Sunflower Electric President and Chief Executive Officer Stuart Lowry said. "Unfortunately, the costs are passed along to consumers through higher electric bills. While consumers are forced to pay higher rates, the underlying problem is the lesser prairie chicken listing."



Scarcity of rainfall, especially in the western half of the state, has put the lesser prairie chicken population in flux. According to an August 2013 Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism survey,"...since 2004 there has been a significant declining trend in the LPCH index but the negative slope is mostly due to recent declines associated with severe drought conditions (not habitat loss)." This corroborates that the drought is contributing to the bird's declining population.

To avoid the lesser prairie chicken's threatened species designation, I have been working with colleagues across the aisle over the past two years. Last summer, along with nine Republican and Democratic Senators, I called on U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services delay a listing decision by six months - the maximum amount of time allowed by federal law. This effort resulted in an extension and additional time for evaluation of the science behind the listing decision. It also gave Kansas and affected states an opportunity to demonstrate alternative plans for species conservation. That call was a follow-up to a February 2013 letter that brought about an extension to the comment period.

This month, Governor Sam Brownback

urged U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and U.S. Department of Interior Secretary Sally Jewel to reconsider the existing conservation programs - Conservation Reserve Program and Environmental Quality Incentives Program – instead of implementing new federal regulations. I'm supportive of that effort and am confident there are ways to address conserving the species without hampering economic growth, as well as farming and ranching activities. In fact, even conservation organizations like Audubon of Kansas support the governor's approach to increase reserve program land as a way to reverse a loss of habitat.

As conservation efforts are considered, producers deserve the flexibility to implement plans that fit their operations. Additionally, it will be imperative to account for ongoing species recovery developments. That's why I introduced legislation last week to protect producers from the consequences of the listing. The legislation would prohibit the U.S. Department of Agriculture and U.S. Department of the Interior from altering any land management practices based on the listing of the lesser prairie chicken as a threatened species.

I am committed to working with U.S. Fish and Wildlife and the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism to make certain the measures implemented are based on sound science and common sense, as well as represent the best interest of producers. We will continue to do what we can to assist folks who are working to solve the problem and avoid thwarting industries vital to our state's economy.

Newly planted trees, shrubs need extra care

Newly planted trees have not established the extensive root system needed to absorb enough water during hot, dry, windy summers. Even trees two or

three years old should receive special care.

Deep, infrequent watering and mulching can help trees become established. Newly transplanted trees need at least 10 gallons of water per week, and on sandy soils they will need that much applied twice a week. The secret is getting that water to soak deeply into the soil, so it evaporates more slowly and is available to the tree's roots longer. One way to do this is to punch a small hole in the side of a 5-gallon bucket and fill it with water. Let the water dribble out slowly next to the tree. Refill the bucket once, and you have applied 10 gallons. Very large transplanted trees and trees that were transplanted two to three years ago will require more water.



Aperforated soaker hose is a great way to water a newly established bed or foundation planting. In sunbaked soil, you may need to rough up the surface with a hoe or tiller to get water to infiltrate easily. It may be helpful to set the kitchen oven timer, so you remember to move the hose or shut off the faucet. If you are seeing surface runoff, reduce the flow, or build a berm with at least a 4-foot diameter around the base of the tree to allow the water to percolate down through the soil, instead of spreading out.


Regardless of method used, soil should be wet at least 12 inches deep. Use a metal rod, wooden dowel, electric fence post or something similar to check depth. Dry soil is much harder to push through than wet.

Impact of Chinese reforms topic of conference

Reforms in densely-populated China and their is currently on the Kansas State Board of Agriculture. implications for U.S. agriculture will take center stage as part of Kansas State University's Risk and Profit Conference. The topic, along with an array of others is part of the annual event this year set for Thursday and Friday, Aug. 21-22 at the Kansas State Alumni Center in Manhattan.

In a keynote address, Dermot Hayes, Pioneer Hi-Bred International Chair in Agribusiness and professor of economics and finance at Iowa State University will present "Impact of Chinese Reforms on U.S.Agriculture." Hayes, a native of the Republic of Ireland, heads the Center for Agricultural and Rural Development and is co-director of the Food and Agricultural Policy Research Institute, a research center administered by CARD at Iowa State and the University of Missouri.

China has the world's largest population, estimated at 1.355 billion people as of July, 2014, according to estimates by the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. That compares with India at 1.236 billion, the United States at 319 million and Russia at 142 million.

Herbicide resistant weed threatens no-till farming

Known by the name tumbleweed. it's been romanticized in story and song. And when it's called summercypress, it sounds downright exotic. No matter what you call it, the weed kochia cuts into crop yields and farmers' profits. And it has become harder to control.

The practice is counter to the common practice of no-till or minimum tillage. Leaving the soil mostly undisturbed leaves a layer of herbicide in addition to normal residue from previous crops, which boosts soil fertility, helps conserve soil moisture and makes it less prone to erosion from wind and rain. In 2010, Stahlman and researchers in other states launched a regional effort to investigate alternatives to glyphosate for kochia control. They found that if an herbicide with residual properties was applied before the weed emerged in early spring, it cut emergence by at least 70 to 80 percent, often more than 90 percent. Then, the kochia that did emerge during the growing season was more easily managed. Fifty-two crop consultants completed a survey in 2012, which covered 46 of Kansas' 105 counties. "Several important points came out," he said. "The percentage of fields infested with kochia increased from 47 percent in 2007 to

Palmer Amaranth problem in central, western areas

Judging by the number of phone calls he receives, thousand per plant. Dallas Peterson is popular this time of year.

The typical topic is weeds – something Peterson, a Kansas State University agronomist, knows well.

Spurred by late spring and early summer rainfall, farmers' row crops across much of the state are thriving. And so are the weeds they're trying to control, including Palmer amaranth, an aggressive and invasive weed that used to be controlled by the popular herbicide glyphosate. Increasingly, however, Palmer amaranth is resisting glyphosate.

The hardy weed has been a serious problem in Kansas for many years and had previously developed populations resistant to atrazine and the acetolactate synthase inhibiting herbicides. With the introduction of Roundup Ready crops in the late 1990s, glyphosate helped to solve some of those problems initially, but glyphosate resistance has now become a problem because of the heavy reliance on it for weed control.

Glyphosate resistant Palmer amaranth first showed up in the southeast United States and has had "We have had numerous calls about poor control a dramatic impact on farmers' production systems

individual flowers. And it saps much-needed moisture from crop land across the High Plains.

For 25 years, however, kochia ,along with other weeds, was successfully controlled by glyphosate, a broad-spectrum herbicide, initially sold under the brand name Roundup and now available under a variety of names.

In 2007, however, Kansas State University weed scientists confirmed resistance to glyphosate in four separate kochia populations in western Kansas, according to Phil Stahlman, a weed scientist, based at Kansas State's Agricultural Research Center in Hays.

"The problem really blew up and got out of control in 2010," said Stahlman, who noted that testing of several populations by his graduate student, Amar Godar, "determined that resistance had become widespread in western Kansas and colleagues in Colorado, Nebraska, and South Dakota had found resistance in those states.



The good news, he said, was in 2011-2012, the use of pre-emergent management began to be used effectively. Observations and reports from retailers indicate that many growers are now using a preemergent herbicide in early spring prior to kochia emergence and many more – perhaps a majority – are using a pre-emergent herbicide in addition to glyphosate in Roundup Ready corn and soybeans.

"If we till the soil to manage kochia, we've lost the conservation gains we made in the last decade or more of using no-till," Stahlman said.

The researcher is optimistic that kochia is manageable by applying pre-emergent herbicide and dealing with what still comes up later.

Peterson, who is a weed specialist with Kansas State Research and Extension. "Glyphosate-resistant Palmer amaranth was first confirmed in Kansas three years ago but seems to be exploding across central Kansas this year. Poor control doesn't mean you have resistance, but if the herbicide treatment provides good control of some plants and not others, that is an indication you may have resistance.'

The weed, also known as Palmer pigweed, is a warm season summer annual weed that generally starts to emerge in May as soil temperatures warm and continues to germinate into summer, especially following rainfall events, Peterson said. It grows rapidly with hot conditions, maybe as much as 1 to 2 inches per day. It is competitive with crops and is a prolific seed producer, up to several hundred

"Producers need to use an integrated approach to weed control that utilizes a variety of cultural practices and herbicide modes of action to help control weeds and minimize herbicide resistance," Peterson said. "The use of effective pre-emergence residual herbicides is probably going to be very important to help manage Palmer amaranth in the future.

"If a producer notices just a few scattered Palmer amaranth that have escaped a glyphosate treatment, it may even be worth hand removing those from fields to prevent seed production. If not, the resistant biotypes will increase and get spread across the field and to other fields by the combine."

"If poor control was achieved with glyphosate, it is probably best to assume that it is resistant and plan accordingly, both this year and in the future," he said.

We have to create opportunities to get our young people back, but that it will be harder for him
