

Lamborn post office name changed to Kanorado

Jan. 17, 1904: By order of the post office department at Washington, the name of the post office at Kanorado has been changed from Lamborn to Kanorado.

On the Rock Island time card, Lamborn has always been known as Kanorado, and in order to have the town known by the same identical name, the change was made, and henceforth the confusion of two names for the same place will be averted.

Jan. 18, 1904: Scientific Methods of Agriculture a Success — The decided success of the Campbell system of farming western Kansas

and Nebraska lands has been established. With the Campbell system of farming, people generally in this section are fairly well acquainted. Its purpose is to conserve moisture and retain it in the soil for the use of plant life in the growing of different kinds of crops.

The principal features are deep plowing, thorough pulverization and repacking of the soil preparatory to sowing or planning crops. This method is practiced for the purpose of preparing a proper seed bed, retain the natural moisture and prevent too rapid evaporation.

While the crops are growing, in the case of wheat lands, a very fine toothed harrow is used in the early part of the season; and in the case of corn lands and other planted crops, a shallow surface pulverization, sufficient to eradicate weeds and leave a very fine mulch of dust to prevent too rapid evaporation in the hot summer weather.

There is no question as to the success of this method, and where it has been employed, astonishing results have followed and good crops have been raised, while on other lands not so treated, crops have been almost

a total failure.

Many counties which have recently come into the wheat belt are indebted principally to the employment of this method for the recent western wheat boom. Should this method be employed in Sherman County, generally the results would not only be greatly beneficial but also astonishing.

The most efficient implement in this process of farming, after thorough pulverization of the soil, is the subsurface packer, the merits of which most of the farmers in this section are acquainted with.

Jan. 19, 1904: Division Superintendent's Office and Force Back to Colorado Springs — Rea-

Jan. 20, 1904: Ice Harvest — The ice harvest for the city of Goodland closed this week, with 510 tons being stored. C.E. Swarts and Kunz Bros. market put in a little over 200 tons each and H.H. Auer & Son about 105 tons.

There having been no snow, the ice was of a beautiful crystal quality from eight to ten inches in thickness. All agree it is by far the best ice ever put up in town, and many people wonder when it had been cold enough to make ice.

The ice came from the F.M. Fox

and other ponds on the Smoky and was hauled in by farmers who received \$1.50 a ton for hauling, and the owners of the ponds 25 cents a ton, and the cutters 25 cents a ton. So that the ice costs, stored, a little over \$2 a ton; and in about a week, over \$1,000 has been disbursed in storing this luxury for the summer months.

The Rock Island ice house, the supply for which is hauled in by rail and requires a complement of 1,200 tons, has not yet been filled.

I said "Goodland," and then there was a surprising answer: "Do you know Marilyn Brouillette?"

I was stunned but said I did, but



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her name is Cooper now, as Ron was gone. A discussion centered around that subject. I finally was told Mary Margaret and Marilyn were classmates and graduated together in Fort Collins, Colo.

As the days turned to weeks, I saw the couple each day, brief visits, but she always reminded me to contact Marilyn when I got home. A few days after Thanksgiving, she was moved back to the hospital for the last time.

A few days later, she was taken to her home with Hospice care to await death. Five days later, she was gone. Her husband, Dr. Moore, son Cal and Cal's wife came to my room the day before her services, and we shared a few moments. It turned out earlier that he had been Martha and Bob's veterinarian.

The day I came home, Dr. Moore came to see me. I was getting my hair done as a favor from the beauty operator. He reminded me about my

promise. I assured him I had her obituary from the paper for Marilyn.

Thus, I said good-bye to my second friend going home for eternity. For the second

time in two weeks, there were tears for the friendship and loss. May she too find peace from her many trials on this earthly journey.

Thanks for all the things being done for and to me. I pray to God each day thanking him for my helpers and the improvement in my road to a normal life.

Several have called and told me how happy they were to see my article in the paper, and they liked my story about my friends, now gone.

I was sorry to be told Florence Farris had to be moved to the Good Samaritan Center because of her serious health problems. May she get better, and God be with her and

her family during these troubled times.

Get well wishes to Mildred Laughlin and Gilbert Thomas that I see in therapy. Gilbert is an outpatient like me, but Mildred is an inpatient. Sympathy to the Musil and Hoss families for their recent losses. See you all next week, God willing.
