

Sport innovator grew up in Goodland

One of the nation's best known and innovative athletic trainers grew up in Goodland and went to establish a business dedicated to the prevention of sports injuries and help athletes heal from injuries.

Garnett E. "Moose" Detty whose love of sports led him from athlete to coach to athletic trainer to inventor and respected businessman spent his formative years in Goodland before starting a journey that some may call legendary.

Perhaps Detty is best known as the inventor of the neoprene rubber knee sleeve which supports and protects the knee while allowing its wearer to retain flexibility and motion. There are 17 patents established for innovations in sports medicine technology that bear Detty's name. All of which are available from Pro Orthopedic Devices of Tucson, Ariz., a firm he started in 1975 and which his eldest son, Gerry, now owns and runs.




