# Health officer said vaccination only way to prevent small pox

### By Evelyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society Jan. 21, 1904: Prevention of Small Pox — "Vaccination is the only sure prevention from small pox," says Dr. Gulick, county health officer. "And I advocate its use by every person who has never been vaccinated and also by those who have not recently protected themselves by the same course. This is the proper procedure for two reasons: First — vaccination usually prevents and always modifies the disease. Second — In a family where a member comes down with the disease, and the other exposed members are immediately vaccinated, the quarantine limitations are earlier, withdrawn upon the recovery of the case, not to mention the possible escape of the other members from the infection.

security. To receive sure protection take a virulent form. But County Attorney Murphy was agreeably surprised when Louis Cullins appeared as defendant and laid claim to one of articles of furniture, for his appearance was evidence that he was materially interested in the case, also saying that he was conducting the billiard hall and his defense therefore threw the costs on him as defendant.

Of the four gambling tables, Cullins claimed one, which was a card and drinking table with pockets arranged at the corners for the reception of empty glasses after the 'drinks" had been quaffed.

He said it was his personal property and that it had been given him by his brother, A.L. Cullins. His defense was adjudged by the court to have no legs to stand on, and the one table was ordered burned by Police Judge Floyd, with the other three not claimed.
