Calving season brought excitement. Raile felt that watching a new-born calf grow into a prospective herd bull brought fulfillment to his life. The annual bull sale was a time of reunion; his children and many nieces and nephews would come to help.

Wheat harvest was another time of joy and pleasure. Raile enjoyed eating his lunch in the field so he never had to leave the wheat.

He enjoyed going to the moun-

tains in the summer. He loved to cool off in the shade of the trees and drop a fishing line in the water. The family camper was his home each summer for a week.

He chose to marry in the fall so he and Ramona could go to the mountains and enjoy the beauty of the sparkling gold aspen trees.

Raile was known as a man of integrity, goodness, love and devotion. He passed his love of God on to his family.

Survivors include his wife; two children, John and Darla; his parents, Bill and Ellen Raile; a sister, Loretta (Jim) Touslee; two brothers, Cliff (Judy) Raile and Marvin (Jacque) Raile; and his son’s fiancée, Sondra.
