sports Goodland boys beat Burlington, lose to the Oberlin Red Devils

The momentum from a 90-68 home win over Burlington on Thursday lasted about five minutes into the third period Friday night as the Cowboys played Decatur Community High in Oberlin, but the Red Devils whipped Goodland 68-59.

The Cowboys scored the first four points Friday and kept the lead throughout the first period for a 14-11 lead. Goodland maintained the lead throughout the second quarter. The Red Devils closed to within two points at 17-15, but later in the period the Cowboys stretched their lead to 13 at one point and took a 35-26 lead into the locker room at halftime.

With Goodland leading 43-41 and less than three minutes left in the third period, Oberlin scored on a three-point basket to go up for the first time in the game, 44-43. From that point the Red Devils outscored the Cowboys 9-3 and led 52-46 at the end of the third quarter.

Both teams went scoreless during the first three minutes of the fourth

period, during which Goodland senior Jared Doke fouled out. A foul by junior Wade Taylor sent Oberlin 14. Doke scored nine, junior Derto the free throw for two shots, both rick Raymer seven, junior Drew of which were good, and the scoring drought was broken. Sophomore Jase Herl hit from three-point range to close the Cowboys to within five at 54-49, but Oberlin responded with six straight points 4 early in the first period, but that to make the score 60-49 with less than four minutes left.

The lead proved to be too much to overcome.
