Feb. 10, 1904: New Street Light has been put up on the corner of 10th and Boulevard. It is called the Doran lamp and cost \$36.

This same brand of a lamp is used in the Dawson & Dawson store, in Arensberg & Cullen's drug store, Cullins' barber shop and in Swarts' meat market. The new lamp throws a powerful light and illuminates the south portion of the north block amply.

The businessmen of the north block purchased the lamp and paid for it collectively. In the putting up of this new street light, a good example has been set. There ought to
