The Goodland Star-News After routing one tribe of Indians on Friday night in St. Francis, the Goodland Cowboys returned home Saturday to get scalped by another.

The Cowboys defeated the St. Francis Indians 76-45, then lost to the Hays Indians the next night 70-52. Goodland is now 6-9 overall and 2-3 in the Northwest Kansas League.

The Cowboys outscored St. Francis in all four periods. Junior Derrick Raymer led the attack with 17 points. Both senior Lance Tedford and junior Drew Wilkens scored 14 points, senior Jared Doke 11, sophomore Jase Herl 10, junior Wade Taylor eight and junior David Livengood two.

Raymer was the team's leader in rebounds with eight followed by Doke with six. Herl had 11 assists.

"This was a good game to get us some confidence," Coach Jon McLean said. "I was really pleased that we only had six turnovers in the game, that allowed us to get a lot of shot attempts. We still didn't shoot the ball real well and we missed a lot of layups. It was good to get five first quarter.

Hays scored first, but a basket by Herl tied the score at 2. Then, after three possession changes, Tedford fed Doke, who drove in for a score and the Cowboys had their only lead of the game 4-2. Hays responded by connecting on back-to-back three-point shots to go up 8-4. From that point, Hays outscored Goodland 11-3, including the last nine points of the period, to lead 19-7 at the end of the

> It was the Cowboys' turn to score the most points in the second period, 14-10, narrowing the Indians' lead to eight at halftime 29-21. Raymer scored five straight points to open the third period and got the Cowboys within three at 29-26. Then Hays responded with five straight to go back up by eight. The Indians scored the last four points of the third period for a 43-32 lead going into the fourth.

In the final period, both teams went on a scoring spree, but Hays dominated early and stretched its lead to 20 at one point. Later, with the score 61-45, the Indians' Curt Stramel went for a slam-dunk which led to two points for the Cowboys.

Stramel, a 6-foot, 7-inch senior, missed a quick slam, then fouled Raymer while trying to get the rebound. Since the Cowboys had the double-bonus, Raymer went to the free throw line for two and made both. It was Stramel's fifth foul to boot.

The Indians outscored Goodland 27-20 in the fourth quarter for a 70-52 win. Hays improved to 12-3 overall for the season.

"Overall I was very pleased with how we played," McLean said. "We cut the lead to three in the third quarter, and had some other opportunities to keep it fairly close. They just wore us down."
