Feb. 23, 1904: Prairie Dog Poison — May Be Had From the State Agricultural College At Cost -One of the most annoying things to farmers of northwest Kansas is the prairie dog.

The prairie dog towns are not very numerous, but wherever they exist near to land devoted to agriculture, they generally do great damage.

Not only do they destroy crops, but they also render the land cov-

grazing purposes. Since this is the case, every farmer and cattleman should endeavor to clear out the pests from their territory, and a little care in feeding the enemy prepared poison will do the work.

For prairie dogs — The poison is put up in half gallon cans. The son is \$1.75 per can, delivered by strychnine in this poison is not in solution but is held in suspension in the syrup. It settles to the bottom of the can after the manner of lead in ordinary mixed paint.

A common error in using it is to pour out a portion of the liquid without first having shaken or stirred it thoroughly. When thus used, the top part of the liquid is not sufficiently poisonous to kill all the animals that eat it.

It will poison a bushel of wheat and be enough for about 1,200 burrows — from 120 to 160 acres. Three or less cans may be sent by express, wrapped in paper, but a larger number must be boxed, although any number can be sent by freight. No charge is made for packing.
