# Air Force A-10 makes unplanned stop here

An Air Force A-10 Thunderbolt II "Warthog" landed at Renner field about 11:45 a.m. Tuesday as a precaution after losing oil pressure on its way from Whiteman Air Force Base, Mo., to Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs. # Air ambulance crash kills three

The first crash in air-ambulance operator EagleMed's 22-year history claimed three lives, but officials says the crash will not affect the company's service in Goodland or reduce the company's service

Three EagleMed crew members were killed early Tuesday, Feb. 17, when their plane crashed in a field several miles north and west of the Dodge City Regional Airport.

The victims were Brandon Bow of Dallas, the pilot, and Jonathan Dye of Meade and Jennifer Hauptman of Coldwater. The plane was on its way back to Dodge City from Wichita Mid-Continent Air-

Among those affected bt the tragedy are officials at Goodland Regional Medical Center.

"We're very sorry about the accident and very sorry for them," said Administrator Jay Jolly. "It's a real shock to anyone. It's hard when any of your professional colleagues have something like that happen."

The accident shouldn't affect the company's operation in Goodland, Jolly said; they are operating other bases as normal. The accident's affect to the medical field was the loss of three trained professionals.

"It's hard enough to find trained health care professionals as it is," Jolly said. "It's hard when they become victims of an accident like that."

EagleMed officials said they lost contact with the plane about 3 a.m. Feb. 17, and a crash was reported northwest of the Dodge City airport at 3:25.
