The Goodland Star-News Goodland Regional Medical Center has bought equipment for a program to help patients with incontinence, and hospital officials and board members toured the physical therapy department to see it during the board's regular meeting Monday.

Jack Lucas, a registered physical therapist, gave the tour of the department. Tammy Morrison, a certified physical therapy assistant, showed off the new equipment.

Morrison said she expects to see more women benefit from the program than men, and not just senior citizens. Many women have some trouble with bladder control after giving birth, she said.

When women do Kegel exercises, Morrison said, sometimes they are using their abdominal muscles. The department's new biofeedback machine will help change that, she said.

An electrode is inserted like a raiser. tampon, she said, and it measures

the contraction of muscles. The relaxing and contracting of muscles is illustrated on a computer screen, ministrator Jay Jolly said, but exshe said, to help patients to visualize their progress in building their muscles.
