### Colby body shop finds 85 pounds of cocaine in secret compartment

#### By Patty Decker

Colby Free Press State troopers thought they had a pretty good bust when they found 87 pounds of cocaine in the silver Nissan Xterra last year.

They seized the car and pretty much took it apart looking for drugs, guns and loot. Then it was scheduled for a sheriff's auction, and the patrol sent the Nissan to a Colby body shop to be put back together.

The vehicle would have been a real steal at auction, though maybe a little too hot to handle.

Employees at Butch's Body Shop discovered a second hidden compartment under the seat last Friday, said Randy Jones, Colby police chief. In it was another 85 pounds of cocaine.

The Kansas Highway Patrol seized 87 pounds of cocaine from the 2001 Nissan exactly one year the hidden floor compartment, ago to the day.

Capt. Kelly McGuire, com-Hays, said that on Feb. 27, 2003, two men from Juarez, Mexico, were arrested after Trooper Terry Kummer stopped them just outside of Colby going east on I-70.

The Nissan had no tag information and was registered in Mexico, McGuire said. The men, Nevarez Vencoma, 36, and Armando Contreras, 39, were taken into custody by the federal Drug Enforcement Agency and the car was left in Colby to be sold.

Jones said two or three auctions passed before the Nissan could be placed on the next round of sales, partly because the vehicle was registered out of Mexico.

After the car was cleared for sale. the next step was getting it back together.

While removing and repairing Jones said, employees at the body

shop saw something unusual under mander of the patrol's Troop D in one of the seats and found more cocaine.

"The second compartment was well-designed," Jones said, "and this does happen."

Jones said drug runners look for many places to stash drugs. It's almost a game.

"We have found drugs in radiators, tires, spare tires, airbags, in the door panels, gas tanks and elsewhere," he said. "In fact, if we can think of a hiding place, so can they."

Most of the time, Jones said, officers do find all the hiding places, but in this case, with 85 pounds of drugs in hand, the patrolman probably thought he had it all.

"Normally, there are telltale signs of something different about the vehicle," Jones said, "and our only other alternative would be to completely tear up the entire car."

McGuire said he is "amazed" at some of the hiding spots.

"One time we found drugs in the engine, and while it was still running," he said.

The days of stashing drugs in the trunk or under the seat are over, he said. It's gotten to be harder and more work to find the stuff.

'Ordinarily we don't miss that big of a chunk," McGuire admitted. Jones said whenever cars are sold at a sheriff's auction, buyers are warned to be aware of possible hidden contraband.

"Maybe a gun or some other kind of weapon could be missed or hidden in an area that was overlooked," he said. "Sometimes the false floors or other hidden areas look like the real thing, complete with a second undercoating.'
