

Prosecution objected to testimony in Dewey trial

Sherman County Historical Society
March 9, 1904: Prosecution Objects to Testimony — C.E. Burnham, ex-sheriff of Cheyenne county, testified that he went to Alpheus Berry's place July 8, 1902, with an attachment. Several attorneys were with him.
 Daniel Berry was there. Burnham said that while he was driving in the horses to be taken under attachment proceedings, the Berry boys shot at him.
 He reported this to the father, who said that if his boys did the shooting, they supposed it was the Deweys they were shooting at. The

prosecution objected to introducing this testimony as evidence. The jury was excused for two hours while the attorneys argued the point. Judge Geiger sustained the objection.
March 10, 1904: During the terrific wind and dust storm, a fire started from an old straw stack bottom on Johnson's place, in the northeast corner of the county, and burned over eight sections before it was extinguished. The head fire traveled at least 12 miles per hour.
March 11, 1904: Charles Posson

of Norton came here with his string of greyhounds Sunday to pit them in a course against the Goodland dogs. The day was fair, and the first race or two was undoubtedly victories for the local hounds.
 But in one of the races, when the coursing was about half through, the decision against one of Posson's greyhounds was thought by him to be unsatisfactory, and the coursing broke up in a running debate.
March 12, 1904: Dewey Case At Standstill — Last Friday, the

progress of the Dewey trial at Norton was hindered by the illness of Juror Darling. Up to that time, the defense had introduced all its main testimony and rested when the prosecution was making ready for rebuttal.
 The burden of the testimony for the defense was to establish the claim that Dewey, McBride and Wilson shot the Berrys in self defense after the Berrys opened up fire on them.
 Court convened again Tuesday of this week, and Judge Geiger ordered the jury to be brought in. Eleven men answered to the call, and the bailiff, having them in

charge, announced that the twelfth juror, O. Darling, was still confined to his bed, though feeling some better.
 The physician attending the juror said he could not safely come into court for duty before next Friday. The court adjourned until next Wednesday morning, at which time it will take another adjournment to such time as the conditions of the juror suggests.
 The sickness of this juror is likely

to bring into this case another complication. Next Monday is the day named by statute for the commencement of the Rawlins County district court, and the probability now is that this case will then be pending.

Church to offer visual display of Jewish Passover

A Colorado Springs woman will give a presentation called "Christ in the Passover" at the Goodland First Baptist Church, Fifth and Center. Using a visual display of traditional Jewish Passover items, Robyn Wilk of the Colorado Springs Jews for Jesus, will explain each item's

their Christological significance at 7 p.m. Monday, March 22.
 The representative foods will be explained but not eaten, and the presentation will include the ceremonial seder plate, the three-compartment pouch in which the matzo (unleavened bread) is kept, and the tra-

ditional cup of Elijah.
 Jews for Jesus has presented the demonstration in over 5,000 churches. It was originally written in 1956 by Moishe Rosen, the group's founder and former executive director.
 The presentation was abstracted

from the writings of the late Rabbi Leopold Cohn, who came to believe in Jesus in 1894 and died in 1936.
 Those who attend the program in Goodland will have the opportunity to examine some of the literature, and Wilk will be available to answer questions. Donations will be accepted.
