# Town awaited news on damage by prairie fire, wind

#### By Evelyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society March 13, 1904: A prairie fire southeast of town Wednesday evening and a strong wind from the northwest doubtless did a great deal of damage in the range and also probably burned some stacks and buildings, but no word has been received from the territory burned over.

The sky in the east was overcast with clouds and the reflections from the fire colored the dark background with long streaks of red light.

At about 8 o'clock, two points in the stretch of the fire loomed up with great prominence, being seen from town, and it was conjectured that the fire had taken in something more than buffalo grass. The fire swept in a southeasterly direction, and when first observed from Goodland, was judged to be about eight or ten miles distant.
