Names released of two passengers killed in accident near Levant

Colby Free Press Two people killed in a wreck on Interstate-70 Wednesday near the Levant exit have been identified as Mexican nationals.

The Kansas Highway Patrol reported Thursday that two people, not three, died in the wreck and there were 10 passengers in the Dodge Caravan when it rolled, not nine as first reported.

Guadalupe Duran, 26, died at Citizens Medical Center in Colby and Gomez P. Martinez, 25, died at the scene of the accident. He was taken to Harrison Chapel in Colby. The white 1997 Dodge Caravan,

driven by Angel Garcia-Perez, 35, of the passengers were airlifted by of Atlanta, was eastbound on I-70 when the vehicle struck the guardrail at mile marker 43 and rolled, coming to rest in the south ditch facing north.

The other passengers in the van were Flora Osario-Velasquez, 26; Ines Alfredo Duran, 16; Gloria Garcia-Duran, 7; Gomez P. Martinez, 25; and Eberto D. Diaz-Mendosa, 17, all of Mexico; Jose A. Esquince-Perez, 28, and Jimenez J. Elavisto, 30, of South Carolina; and Mary N. Tello, 23, of Chicago.

Garcia-Perez, the driver, and the other passengers were taken to Citizens Medical Center and later five

Eagle Med for treatment elsewhere. Diaz-Mendosa who was flown to Swedish Medical Center in Denver. None of the occupants was wear-

ing a seat belt, the patrol said.
