The Goodland Arts Council wanted to find a forum to display these talents, she said, and give area

home-design experts a showcase for their creative skills.

You will provide the table and all materials. You are encouraged to

Members of an organization can design the table, or you can ask an individual to design a table on behalf of your organization.

The gallery has enough room for six small (4 person) tables and three large (6-8 person) tables, so entries will be taken on a first come, first serve basis until Friday, April 30. There is no entry fee.

Throughout the month, visitors will vote for their favorite table, and at the end of the show, the table with the most votes will be awarded a \$100 cash prize.

Because of limited space, an organization should have only one entry.

taken from a vehicle.

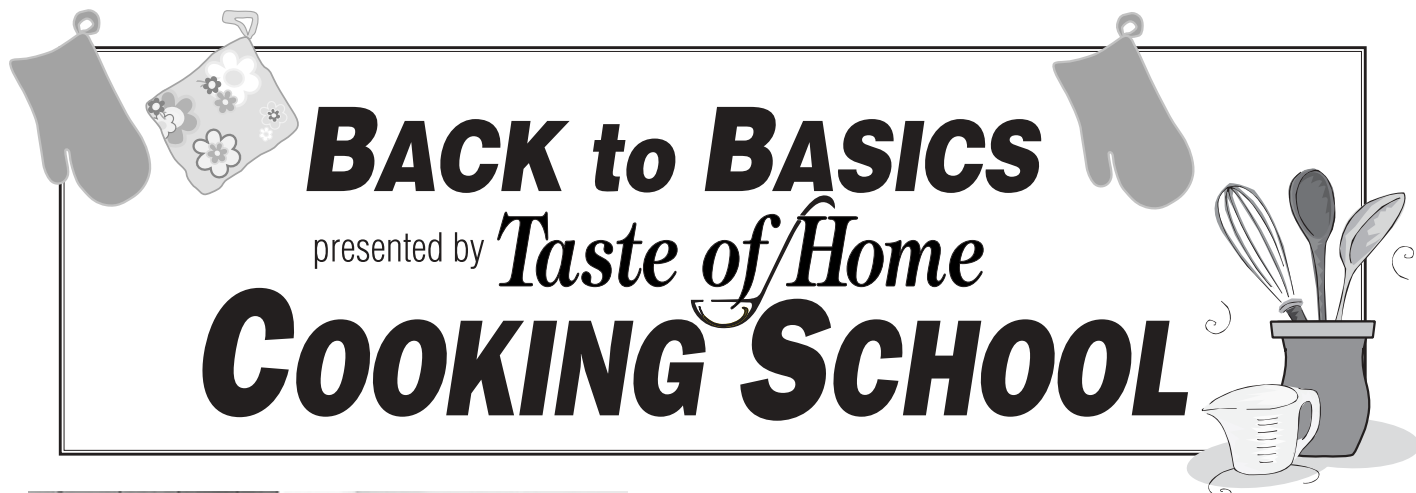
Brittney Espinoza was the victim of disorderly conduct and reported an estimated \$100 in criminal damage to a door at 304 Broadway Ave.
