City commission to see park plans

The Goodland City Commission will see plans for fixing up Gulick Park when it meets at 5 p.m. Monday.

City Manager Ron Pickman said that Jerry Fairbanks, head of the city's parks committee, would be at the meeting to present the park plans.

The city crew has been working on some improvements, and there are plans to install a sprinkler system and put sidewalks around the outside of the park. The committee is looking at a walking trail through the park and adding playground equipment.

The commission will review and approve a conflict of interest disclosure which is required as part of the Community Development Block Grant economic development loan Class B storage and setting rates for for Aircraft Seal and Gasket Corp. Pickman said Doug Bruggeman, with the Northwest Kansas Regional Planning and Development Commission in Hill City, asked the commission to approve the disclosure as a part of the economic development loan paperwork.

When Bruggeman spoke to the commission in December about the loan for Aircraft Seal and Gasket, City Commissioner Chuck Lutters did not participate because he is plant manager for the company.

Pickman said the disclosure is to show that the conflict of interest was announced.
