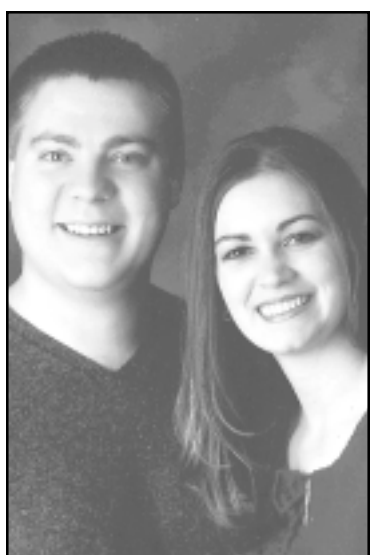

Deweys planned to plead guilty to fencing land

**April 13, 1904:** Deweys Will Confess — It is expected that C.P. Dewey, the millionaire Kansas ranchman, his son, Chauncey and the foreman of his ranch, W.J. McBride, will go into the federal court at Topeka this week and plead guilty to the charge of unlawfully fencing government land in Sherman and Cheyenne counties.

It is understood that they are ready to accept the sentence of the court. The offense charged against the Deweys is punishable by a fine and jail sentence, but by pleading guilty, they may escape by paying a fine. The evidence gathered by government inspectors has been so

ample and copious in this case against the Deweys that the escaping of the truth of the charge is impossible.

**April 14, 1904:** Dewey Juror May Be Insane — Lecount, one of the jurors in the Dewey-Berry murder trial, was taken to Norton in a demented condition. He is being tried for sanity.

Mr. Lecount imagines that his neighbors want to do him personal violence. He had armed himself with a revolver. At times he becomes violent.

Two others on the jury are said to

be acting queerly. Several jurors have received threats through the mails that they would be punished for the verdict returned. They were warned to leave the country.

**April 15, 1904:** Sheriff Bradley Interviewed in Chicago — George Bradley was in Chicago two weeks ago with a load of fine Sherman county horses that attracted a great deal of attention on the horse market.

*The Chicago Live Stock Journal* contained the following: “George M. Bradley, Goodland, Kan., was on the market recently with a mixed

load of drafters and Boston chunks, which were closed out at very satisfactory prices,” says Col. J.B. Jackson of the *Drovers Journal*.

“Mr. Bradley is a prominent citizen of Sherman county and heads the county ticket in the approaching county election as a candidate for sheriff. He reports Kansas rapidly coming to the front as a horse breeding state, having at the last census 871,908 horses valued at \$55,226,565, being on the average of \$68.34 per head.

“Kansas has more horses than Missouri or Nebraska and only falls 24 head below the census of Ohio. Mr. Bradley reports that more good draft stallions have been imported into Kansas during the last five

years than during the fifteen previous seasons.

“The climate, native grasses, soil and water of Kansas are admirably adapted to the horse industry, and the state is destined to ultimately take the first rank among states that lead in the raising of fine horses.”

**April 16, 1904** Another Women’s Christian Temperance Union organization has been added in Llanos township, in the northeast part of this county. It was organized March

4 with eight members; Mrs. Mary McDaniels, president.
