Soldier returns to U.S.

First Lt. Carl Friedrichs returned to the U.S. with his unit March 27 after serving a year in Iraq.

Lt. Friedrichs is a platoon leader with the 664th Ordnance Company, an ammunition logistics unit, of the 64th Support Group, 3rd Support Command stationed at Fort Hood, Texas.

Supporting the 4th Infantry Division during initial operations in Iraq, his platoon issued more than 18,000 tons of ammunition. Later, his platoon provided ammunition support to units of the 3rd Infantry and the 1st Armored divisions. For a time, his platoon operated an ammunition collection point for captured enemy munitions, destroying over 500 tons of captured ammunition.

For his service in Operation Iraqi Freedom, Lt. Friedrichs received the Bronze Star.

The son of Dennis and LeAnn Friedrichs of Goodland and Linda and Kelly Beek of Cheyene Wells, Colo., he graduated from the University of Southern Colorado in Pueblo in May 2001.

In June, Friedrichs enlisted in the Army. After finishing basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., he was sent to Fort Benning, Ga. for officer candidate school. Friedrichs was commissioned a second lieutenant in December 2001 and assigned to the Ordnance Corps. He completed branch training at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md., after which he reported for duty at Fort Hood.

Lt. Friedrichs is now back at Fort Hood after a short leave. His wife Carly, whom he married in January 2001, is a elementary teacher in Killeen, Texas. They have a 16-month-old daughter, Bailey.

Dennis Friedrichs said he expects his son and his family to visit Goodland on leave around June, after the school year.
