Deweys pleaded guilty to fencing land

Sherman County Historical Society April 21, 1904: Jail Sentence For Deweys — Plead Guilty to Charge of Fencing Government Land — Have Still to Face Charge of Conspiracy in Interfering With Rights of Citizens, Also Civil Case Against the Dewey Land and Cattle Company — C.P. Dewey and Chauncey Dewey were fined \$150 each and sentenced to serve one day in the Shawnee county jail by United States Judge Pollock last Wednesday.

This case was tried before the federal court in Topeka. The charge against the Deweys was fencing government land in Rawlins and adjacent counties. They entered a plea of guilty.

consultation with the United States Attorney Dean several times during the few days previous to the trial, and it was understood that they would enter a plea of guilty, and the fine would not be very heavy.

The cases of W.J. McBride and W.J. Ratcliff, who were indicted at the same time as the Deweys and on the same charge, have been nolled. The Deweys are under bond, and for which they have indicted, but not tried.

The next case that the Deweys will be called in is the case against J.G. Waters and John E. Hessin, C.P. Dewey, Chauncey Dewey, W.J. land.

The charge is that they conspired to interfere with the rights of citizens, guaranteed by the government. There are many people who accuse the Deweys of taking their land from them or of making it worthless by reason of their great fences.

tion preventing the company from fencing government land, and it is likely that it will be made permanent, as was done in the case against the Mills Cattle company, which was forever restrained from fencing government land by the order of the court.
