# Trainmen's union held ball

Sherman County Historical Society April 24, 1904: Ball Big Success - Three Hundred People in Attendance, the Guests of the Trainmen -The first annual ball of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, Goodland Lodge No. 327, held in the opera house was attended by 300 people, out of town guests being present from Phillipsburg, Colby, Colorado Springs, Denver, Burlington and Fairbury, Neb.

Seventy-two couples formed for the grand march. The music by Fink's orchestra of Colorado Springs was pronounced perfect in rhythm and delightful in harmony.

The ball lasted until several of the morning hours had been stripped away. At twelve o'clock, the ladies of the Catholic church served supper on the stage which, on account of the abundance of the good things provided, the proceeds amounted to \$85

Neither pains nor expense were spared by the trainmen in making their first annual ball a splendid success. At the vestibule entrance of the hall, three "tail" lights used on ca-

booses were arranged in a triangular form, two red semaphores throwing out their persistent light at the base, and the green one from the top.

Within the triangle and thrown out by light were the figures representing the number of the lodge, "327." The inside of the hall was illuminated with large gasoline lamps, and the decorations, while not profuse, were striking.

Large mirrors casting back the images of the dancers were hung along the sides, and the three large columns along the center of the hall bore red and green flags and lanterns, colors of the trainmen's order.

The concert from 8:30 to 9 o'clock abounded in good music and pleasing specialties. Many people who were not dancers came only for the pleasure of hearing the music, and the sweet notes kept up their charm, calling out so naturally to something within that wants to move to rhythmic music.

The trainmen received much Ben Jayne praise for the good time they provided for the patrons of the dance.

The new firm is known as Bartholomew & Jayne. Mr. Jayne assumed a partnership in the business as soon as the invoice was made.

For many years, he has been living on his ranch in Sherman county and is one of our thrifty farmers. Besides a cash consideration, Mr. Jayne traded in his three quarters of land on the deal. He will move his family to town soon.

John Heston, the retiring member of the firm, succeeding W.S. Coleman in the feed store business, D.E. Bartholomew being a little later made a partner. Mr. Heston is a good business man and is very well liked among the people of the county. He will engage in other business.

If nominated, the applicant must meet admission requirements of the academies, which will make the final decision.
