Mrs. Busse was a Sunday school teacher and 4-H leader and a member of he Kanred Extension Club, Lutheran churchwomen, the altar guild, a Good Samaritan volunteer, Cub Scout leader, and co-chairman of the Eggers Building displays at the Antique Thresher Show. In 1999, she was honored as queen of this show.

Her hobbies included vegetable gardening and roses, cooking, piano playing, friends and pinochle, especially the women's and couple's groups she was in for many vears.

The Busses moved into Bird City in 1987. In March 2003, she moved to the Good Samaritan Village in St. Francis.
