'Gooney Bird' pilot towed gliders to France

Byron "Coke" Myers flew para- the assault across the Rhine. troopers into combat, towing their defenseless gliders across

the English Channel during the D-Day invasion, on into France and eventually across the Rhine into Germany itself.

Piloting a lumbering C-47 "Gooney Bird" transport, Myers made five combat missions hauling paratroopers.

The list reads like a roll call of major battles in Europe: 1942 to September 1946, leaving Normandy, Holland, the Bulge and the service with the rank of cap-

The transports and gliders were

a constant target of German antiaircraft fire

said Myers. Although enemy fighters were a threat, he said they had pretty good cover from allied fighers.

Myers, a lifelong Goodland resident, served in the Air Air

Corps from September

Myers trained as a C-47 transport pilot at Brooks Army Air Field near San Antonio, Texas.

The C-47 was the Army's version of the DC-3, a two-engined general purpose transport plane first built to serve the airline industry in 1936.

In Texas, Myers trained to tow gliders and drop paratroopers. Later, he was assigned to the 93rd Squadron of the 439th Troop Carrier Group, and he served with the unit until discharged.

He said his outfit spent 18 months overseas, nine in England and nine

Myers said three of the glider pilots in his squadron got their preglider training with the 229th Glider Training Detachment in Goodland.

Myers said he participated in five missions towing gliders. The first was on D-Day, when he towed a British-made Horsa glider.

Myers said he made two missions into Holland during "Operation Market Garden" and one to Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge. In that mission, the glider he towed was flown by a pilot named performing glider missions, they Andex who was one of three trained mostly flew resupply and medical

Myers said his last glider mission was the airborne crossing of the Rhine River near Wesel, Germany. He towed two gliders at one time for that mission.
