In my last "Gripes," I tried, and probably failed, to describe how the Atlantic 10 Football Conference is organized and how its system of confusion involved five other conferences.

The Atlantic 10 was the first conference I looked at as I prepare to follow the 2004 college football season. I decided to start with NCAA Division I-AA football this year because I was becoming disenchanted with Division I-A and wanted to try something simpler. Boy was I fooled.

The Atlantic 10 is a mess and made worse by changes for the upcoming season, but enough about them.



On the opposite end of the confusion scale is the Ivy League, the second Division I-AA conference I looked at. It has a simple organization. It has eight schools and all of them play football in the Ivy League. Each team plays a 10-game schedule, seven conference games and three non-conference. Nice and

simple, so why do I have gripes?

As I said, Ivy League teams play 10 games when nearly every other team in Division I-AAplay 11. I think all teams playing at one level should

play the same number of games. Plus, with a 10-game schedule there is a good chance one or more teams will end their season 5-5, neither a winning nor losing season.

I think players would rather not play a whole season just to break even. This peeve also applies to Division I-A now that most of those playoffs.

teams play a 12-game schedule.

Another gripe I have with the Ivy League is that they don't play in the national playoffs. Granted, since the league is not known as a football power, there is little chance for one of its team to qualify. However most teams, at any level, will "have their day in the sun" just as the University of Pennsylvania did last season. The Quakers went 10-0, wining their second straight league title.

Pennsylvania finished No. 12 and was the only undefeated Division I-AA team in the final 2003 USA Today/ESPN football poll, but was not among the 16 teams in the national

So now I've griped about a con- for whatever reason ference that is too complicated and one that is too simple. Will I ever be happy? Probably not, but I do have hope. I just believe that schools should compete within their own conference for all sports. For those schools with football in a conference that doesn't sponsor it, the best solution is get with others in a similar position and form a footballonly conference.

Each team playing at a certain level should play the same number of games. All teams who qualify should participate in the playoffs, but I also believe each school has the right to decline post-season play

Some readers may wonder why I concentrate on college football and not the pros. I stopped paying attention to professional football after the second players' strike in 1987, which — with the absurdity of its players-versus-owners contract negations - convinced me to find the real football spirit elsewhere.

Division I-A football is starting to lose its luster for me as well, but as I said, I have hopes.

Last season was my first reporting on high school football so its too early for me to offer any opinions about it for now.
