The history of Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, goes back over 130 years. Former Union general John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in a general order on May 5, 1868 proclaimed May 30 as a day to honor the fallen soldiers, sailors and marines from both sides who fought in the Civil War. The order called for the placing of flowers or other decorations on the graves of those who died in the service.

After World War I, the day began who died in the service of their coun-

(Mountain Time) with a short cer- try. In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson proclaimed Waterloo, N.Y., as the birthplace of Decoration Day, which the next year became Memorial Day.

The National Holiday Act of 1971 changed Memorial Day from May 30 to the last Monday in May as part of the program to create three-day weekends. In January 1999, Sen. Daniel Inouye of Hawaii introduced Senate Bill 189 which calls for restoration of Memorial Day back to May 30. That April, Rep. Jim Gibbons of Nevada introduced the bill to the House. The bill is still in committee.

In December 2000, the National Moment of Remberance was established. Participation is voluntary and informal; people are asked to to honor all of America's veterans take a minute of silence at 3 p.m.
