

Anonymous letter writer asked to sign name

June 3, 1904: If the parties who are writing me anonymous letters relative to the violations of law in Sherman County will sign their names to the same or confer with me personally, vigorous prosecutions will be commenced and be maintained in all cases where there are reasonable grounds for such action. But persons who are too cowardly to sign their names to what they have written can hardly expect me to consider the charges made in such communications. E.F. Murphy, County Attorney.
June 4, 1904: Cattle Prices at Kansas City Market Still Advancing — The general cattle market continued last week the advance inaugurated more than two weeks ago, and has kept it up first two weeks of this

week. Prices were 10 to 15 cents higher yesterday on killing cattle than Friday's close and market is strong today. About 80 percent of the cattle now being marketed are bringing \$2 to \$7 per head more than they were two weeks ago. Following prices for different kinds are now ruling here: Beef steers up to \$5.70, which was top price today, with bulk of sales above \$5; heifers at \$4.50 to \$5.25, for best ones, fair to good cows at \$3.50 to \$4.50; veal calves up to \$5. Outside of mild fluctuations, cattle market is expected to go still higher.
June 5, 1904: Petition For Bond Election — Petitions are being circulated for the signatures of taxpayers of Goodland for a bond election. The petition proposes the issue of \$10,000 in bonds to erect a stand

pipe and enlarge the water works and mains of Goodland. It is proposed to erect an iron stand pipe 80 feet high and 16 feet in diameter and also to enlarge the power plant and system of the water mains. It requires the signatures of 3/5 of the tax payers, and the election must carry by a 2/3 majority vote. If sufficient subscribers are secured, the mayor will issue a proclamation for an election.
June 6, 1904: Reduce Forces At Goodland — Rock Island Lays Off About 50 Employees At This Place — Lack of Business the Cause — Railroad officials all over the west have been predicting a big decrease in the operating forces within the next few months. The inclination on all roads at present is to decrease operating expenses. It is because of this condi-

tion that men are being let out at many points. Roads in the east have cut down their forces by thousands, but a few western officials claim that the reductions will not be so extensive as has been given out. For over a year, there has been an unprecedented amount of traffic, both freight and passenger, over this division of the Rock Island, and many new employees in the train departments have been added. Besides this, the road has made extensive improvements and enlargement of their works in Goodland, doubling the capacity of the shops and enlarging their ice house and other yard facilities. The retrenchment put in force is only a business proposition. The latest employee to enter the service is laid off because the policy both of preferment and retirement is

one of seniority. The reduction at Goodland numbers about fifty men, and those affected in the train department are nine engineers, sixteen firemen and nine brakemen, and seven firemen promoted to engineers about a year ago are reduced to firemen. In the mechanical department, two boilermakers, two machinists, one blacksmith, four helpers, two car repairers and five round house laborers on the night shift were let out. While the exigencies of the service require this reduction, and it is to be regretted, yet it is only what an individual always does, when he has no further work for men, pays them off and lets them go.
June 7, 1904: Coffin's Coffee House to Open — The new Coffin Coffee House will be opening for

business Saturday. It is a very complete and up-to-date restaurant. The building was erected especially for the restaurant business by Jerry Coffin, who has been engaged in that line of trade for many years. The large range is enclosed in an iron clad ventilator, and it has hot and cold water lavatory, with bathroom in the rear. The plumbing and drainage has been thoroughly arranged. A New England dinner will be served at noon, and short orders will be served at all hours, both night and day. From weekly issues of The Goodland News, provided by the Sherman County Historical Society. Since the paper was published weekly, some items were arbitrarily assigned a date.
