

Goodland youth group receives tobacco prevention grant

The Motivation, Achievement, Success (M.A.S.) Youth Group of Sherman County has been awarded the Outreach to Ethnic and Minority Youth Tobacco Prevention grant from TASK, a statewide youth tobacco prevention coalition, for the third consecutive year.

The grant will support Sherman County youths in their tobacco prevention efforts. This youth-led tobacco use prevention grant is part of the statewide youth movement promoting tobacco-free teens by uniting communities to create one strong voice standing against the tobacco industry.

“This grant will allow M.A.S. an opportunity to expand its mission of . . . enhancing the quality of life for

youth and their families in Sherman County, to promote positive youth development by preventing alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse among youth,” said Claudia Lopez, Goodland High School Junior. “We’re excited about spreading our message.”

The Hispanic Advisory Board of Sherman County has assisted and guided youths in their efforts against

tobacco manipulation. This grant will provide the youth group with resources to mobilize youths to take a stand against tobacco. The group will employ an integrated, multicultural approach designed to promote changes in knowledge, attitudes, behaviors and the development of policies and regulations that dissuade minority youths from becoming addicted to tobacco.

The group’s grant proposal includes the following activities, events and programs:

- Comenzando Bien (Good Start, created by the March of Dimes) bilingual program to pregnant teens and teen parents regarding second-hand smoke.
- “Scene Smoking: Cigarettes, Cinema & the Myth of Cool” This two-part event will focus on how from fashion styles to music trends, young people often emulate celebrity images that they see on screen, including the use of tobacco. The first part targets youths, and the second targets parents.
- “Young lives are not for sale” bilingual sticker project. The goal is to make young readers aware and warn them that when they read Big Tobacco ads they are being lured into purchasing the product and sell-

- ing their lives to Big Tobacco.
- Create a bilingual media regarding secondhand smoke.
- Continue to take the opportunity to provide/enhance Family Nights, health fairs, school functions and other community events where we can continue to raise awareness regarding secondhand smoke and other tobacco use.
- Host a community sharing session luncheon (or breakfast) to highlight current group efforts and accomplishments.

Kansas youth smoking rates have declined since 2000 but remain at high levels. According to the 2002 Kansas Youth tobacco survey, 21 percent of all Kansas high school kids smoke, and 15 percent of high

school males use spit tobacco. In Kansas, the tobacco industry spends an estimated \$106.4 million per year to market their products. This grant is sponsored by TASK through a grant from the American Legacy Foundation. The American Legacy Foundation was formed as a result of the tobacco master settlement with states and seeks to counter the messages youths receive from the tobacco industry. Elks Lodge to hold Flag Day ceremony Monday at West school

The Goodland Elks’ annual Flag Day ceremony will begin at 10 a.m. Monday at West Elementary School.

Ron Barkley, lodge Americanism chairman, is in charge of the program. He said the ceremony will include an honor guard provided by the Goodland Girl Scouts and patri-

otic music presented by Pat Thompson’s students. Americanism essay contest winners Shenna Sexton and Maria Rodriguez will read their work. There will be a special presentation of a U.S. flag that flew over the Capitol, and everyone who attends will receive a personal U.S. flag.

The Elks stage the Flag Day ceremony each year because the American Flag is tied to the principals of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. June 14 is a day set aside by Congress to honor the flag and its history, dating back 226

years. Flag Day commemorates June 14, 1777, when the Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes as the national flag. Observance of the day began in 1885. Inspired by three decades of state

and local celebrations, Flag Day was officially established by President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated for years after Wilson’s proclamation, it was not until August 3, 1949,

that President Harry S Truman signed a law designating June 14 as national Flag Day. Flag Day is the start of the 21-day salute to the flag which ends with the celebration on Independence Day of July 4.
