# Man was killed by 11-year-old daughter

#### By Evelyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society June 17, 1904: She Killed Her Father — A.C. Jenkins of Norton, while beating his wife, was shot dead by his 11 year old daughter. Jenkins was no doubt insane, as he had often threatened to kill his whole family. The coroner held an inquest, and the jury brought in the verdict of justifiable patricide.
