I simply can't believe it. Another bowl game has been added to the NCAA Division I-A football postseason.

As I was at the office last Sunday waiting for the scores from the Lady Outlaws journey to North Platte, Neb., I picked up the sports section of Saturday's Hays Daily News and saw where the Bowl Championship Series was going to add another game.

Great! As bad as the Bowl Championship Series has been, it'll be worse next season. I thought one of the main reasons for creating the series was to eliminate the possibility of a split championship, something it failed to do last season. Now, apparently, the solution is to add another game into the mix.

Bowl games have become a joke. There were 28 of them last season and apparently that's still not enough. For years now, I've complained that more games lessens the bowls' prestige. When they increased the number to 28 a few years ago, there already was a problem finding quality teams.

Now I understand why the majority of Division I-A schools now have 12-game regular seasons,. It allows for more teams to make the minimum qualification of six Division I-A wins. However, I for one find it hard to get excited about a bowl game that features two teams that went 6-6 during the regular sea-



son. Having 29 bowl games means 58 Division I-A teams will play in the post-season, nearly half of the total. This is compared to 16 teams that 11 last season. Still, it's sad to hear make the national playoffs in both Division I-AA and Division II, both of which have more teams. At the forward to the next season have to Division III level, 24 teams make change their plans. the playoffs but there are over 200 teams competing there.

Bowl games are driven by money, not the quest for a national champion. The more games played, the more schools make money. That means some schools will do almost anything to get a bid to a bowl game even if it means not paying attention to graduation rates or player misconduct.

Maybe that's why I've been concentrating on Division I-AA lately. To me, I-AA still represents the college football spirit while I-A seems to have turned into a commercial venture. Some of the things I dislike in professional sports are creeping into Division I-A football.
