He was seventh in the 110meter high hurdles with a time of 20. 92 seconds and 14th in the long jump with a leap of 14 feet 3 inches.

Pennington was a member of the eighth-grade boys team from Grant Junior High this past season.

The top four finishers from each advance to the Missouri Valley Championships at which the athletes from Kansas and Missouri will compete. The meet will be at the Platte County High School track in northwest of Kansas City International Airport.
