Why does a child use drugs? According to the National Clearing House for Alcohol and Drug Information some parents of drug users think that their child might have been pressured into taking drugs by peers or drug dealers.

But children say they choose to use drugs because they want to relieve boredom, feel good, forget their troubles and relax, have fun, satisfy their curiosity, take risks, ease their pain, feel grown-up, show their independence, belong to a specific group and look cool.

Rather than being influenced by new friends whose habits they adopt, children and teens often switch peer groups so they can hang around with others who have made the same lifestyle choices.
