The stage was amply decorated with flowers and house plants and class colors. Above depended the class motto: "virtus, sua gloria," in large yellow letters.

The hall was brilliantly illuminated, and a goodly number of our townspeople and friends of the school were in attendance.

A piano duet was the first number, after which a march was played while the class marched to their seats upon the platform. The invocation was given by the Rev. J.E. Stevens, followed by a song by a male quartet.

In a general way it may be said that the six graduates acquitted themselves well. Some remarked upon the excellence of this one or that one, and after all was said. words of commendation extended to efforts of the whole class.
