One in four crashes killing children involves alcohol

The Kansas Drunk Driving Prevention Office is sharing a couple of very important bits of information with every Kansan:

1. Alarming information has recently been released regarding the number of children killed in alcohol-related crashes.

The Centers for Disease Control motor-vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children older than one but younger than 18. In addition, one in four crash-related deaths among child passengers, ages 0-14, involves alcohol use.

Alcohol abuse among elderly often masked by common ailments

Alcohol abuse in the elderly is sometimes called a hidden epidemic because its symptoms often mimic or are masked by common physical and mental infirmities of aging, such as lessened alertness, depression, anxiety and diminished physical capacity.

Also, doctors rarely ask their elderly patients when and how much they drink or what effect it has on their lives. Various circumstances common among older people can increase the risk of alcohol abuse, even in someone who has never had a previous alcohol problem.

Retirement may result in a loss of structure, self-esteem and income and an increase in loneliness and boredom. Other losses such as spouses, friends, physical well-being or independence as well as pain or sleep problems may also prompt older people to turn to alcohol.



The effects of a given amount of alcohol can be greatly exaggerated in an older person because the physical body that is consuming alcohol at age 65 or older is not the same as the one that drank at age 45.

In addition, as people age, there is a decline in a stomach enzyme that starts to break down alcohol before it reaches the bloodstream. Blood alcohol levels in older people are typically 30 to 40 percent higher than in younger people who consume the same amount of alcohol. But even at equivalent blood alcohol levels, older people are more middle aged to experience intoxication, cognitive difficulties and problems with balance and coordination. In other words,
