July 26, 1904: Local Men Buy 10,240 Acres — Biggest Land Deal in History of County, Including 64 Quarter Sections — The biggest land deal ever made in Sherman County was closed this week, whereby 64 quarter sections owned by Charles Johnson in townships seven and eight, range thirty eight, was sold to three of our townsmen Goodland News, provided by the -Messrs. J.W. Tibbles, R.A. Kent and Ira Wolfe.
