Township trustees ordered to investigate financial needs of paupers

By Evelyn Ward Sherman County Historical Society

August 4, 1904: Notice to Township Trustees — It is hereby ordered by the board of county commissioners that the several township trustees of Sherman County shall make a thorough investigation of the financial condition and needs of each and every applicant applying to them for aid or assistance as a county charge or pauper.

If, after such investigation, the trustee finds the applicant in need and entitled to assistance under the laws governing such case, the trustee shall make a list of the articles needed (necessaries of life only, to be ordered by trustees), affixing the amount in dollars and cents opposite each article, and sign

It is further ordered that the several trustees shall keep a record of

The will was executed a few days prior to his death, and Mr. Dewey's secretary assisted in drawing it up. The contest will be made on the grounds that Mr. Dewey was in no condition at the time to make a will.

August 7, 1904: Milk Cows By Machine — Device Used in Germany That Ought to Be Used in Sherman County — More and more, dairying is being reduced to a science, and now upon the heels of the cream separator, comes a device for milking cows which, if it were introduced into this county, would make our farmers smile blandly and give them the buoyant feeling of having seized fortune by the forelock.

"In the newly invented apparatus for milking cows by electricity," writes S.P. Warner, United States consular agent to Gera, Germany, "rubber hoods are attached to the udder of the cow. These hoods are assigned a date.

connected with a vessel for receiving the milk by means of a rubber tube, from which the air is exhausted by means of the electrical

'It is claimed that the suction thus secured resembles very closely to the sucking of a calf and that, for this reason, the cow lets down her milk more freely than when milked by hand. It is also claimed that absolute cleanliness of the milk may be secured when this method of milking
