
# Collegiate football belongs on Saturday

votes in Sherman County. State Rep. Jim Morrison of the 121st District, running unopposed, received 1,287 votes.

District Judge Jack Burr received 1,164 votes in Division 2, and Glenn Schiffner had 1,091 in Divi-

On the Democratic side, Commissioner Mitch Tiede, running unopposed received 107 votes in

District 2. Tim Peterson, running unopposed for the 40th State Senate seat received 180 votes. Peterson will face Ostmeyer in the November

general election. In the Democratic race for the U.S. Senate nomination, Sherman County voted for Robert Conrov 115, over Lee Jones, 107. Statewide, Conroy won with 56 percent of the vote, 60,042, to 44 percent for Jones, 47,322.
