Dewey children's battle to set aside father's will sent to Illinois court

**August 11, 1904:** The Fight of Chauncey for the Lion's Share — After more than a week of argument and delay, Judge Cutting, of Cook County, Ill., has admitted the will of Charles P. Dewey to probate.

The fight by Chauncey Dewey and his sister, Emma, to set aside the will of their late father will follow in the Cook county courts and is

expected to be one of the most bitter legacy contests ever waged.

Mrs. Gertrude M. Dewey, the widow, is in Manhattan, where separate maintenance proceedings were pending against Dewey at the time of his death.

A daughter, Miss Emma Dewey, who was cut off with \$5,000, is the

most vigorous contestant of the will.

Charles P. Dewey was on his death bed in Wheeling, W. Va., when he signed the paper disposing of his large estate. The signature is scrawled and barely legible.

During the argument before Judge Cutting, it was asserted that he was under the influence of opiates. The document was signed June 7, 1904. He died June 10.

Charles T. Killen, who was Mr. Dewey's private secretary, divides with Chauncey, the son, the larger portion of the estate. In Cook county alone the personal estate of Dewey amounted to \$400,000 and the realty to \$275,000. In Kansas he owned miles of range land, thousands of cattle and horses, a hotel accommodating 1,000 guests and other property.

**August 12, 1904:** Miss Olive M. Blunt will give lectures on temper-

ance and missions in the Christian church August 17, 18 and 19, under the auspices of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Miss Blunt has been a missionary to Japan and is a student of the temperance situation in our country. She brings with her a fine stereopticon and makes her lectures interesting with illustrations.

**August 13, 1904:** Harvesting is over; next comes threshing. Early barley and rye are good; but spring

wheat, which promised a good yield until rust struck it, is almost a failure.

Durum, or macaroni wheat, seems to be the wheat this year. Durum wheats may revolutionize farming on the sunny plains of the great west.
