City sets special meeting

State law requires a new city commissioner to be appointed to fill a vacancy within 10 days, so there will be a special meeting at 8 a.m. Wednesday to replace Commissioner Chuck Lutters, who resigned last week.

City Manager Ron Pickman said Friday he had checked the law and found the 10-day requirement.

"The commissioners had planned to take a week or two to find a new commission member," he said, "but the law will mean we have a special meeting at 8 a.m. on Wednesday."

The vacancy was created last Monday with the resignation of Lutters, who had served on the commission for 10 years. Lutters, who has been the plant manager for Aircraft Seal and Gasket, has resigned from that job and has applied to be the city public works director. Pickman said Monday he had hired Lutters as the public works director and he will start work next Monday.

Pickman said the four remaining commissioners will be the ones nominating and appointing the replacement, who will serve until the city election in April. He said the City Attorney Perry Warren is to cast a fifth vote in case there is a tie.

Once the commissioner is appointed at the special meeting, Pickman said, the person will be sworn in at the commission meeting on Monday, Aug. 16.

Anyone interested in filling the position should contact one of the four commissioners or attend the special meeting Wednesday.

Pickman said a similar situation happened 10 years ago, and Warren had to break a tie vote which gave Lutters the edge 3-2 to fill a vacancy created by the death of city commissioner Larry Koons in August 1995. Gary Ginther was the other person nominated to fill the vacancy.

School district budget has tax levy increase of 2.5 mills

The Goodland Star-News The tentative budget approved by the Goodland School Board includes a tax levy increase of about 2.6 mills for the local option budget, which brings it back up close to where it was for the 2002-2003 school vear.

The budget calls for a tax levy of 14.534 mills for the local option budget, which is expected to provide \$763,172 for the 2004-2005 school year.

For the year just finished, the

board wanted to raise \$628,125 for the local option budget. For 2002-2003, it asked for \$787,732. The lesser amount for 2003-2004 was due to the Legislature allowing the state to collect property taxes a month early, in May instead of June, which made for an 11-month tax year. Now, said Superintendent Marvin Selby, the tax year is back to 12 months, requiring that the levy return to the previous level.

The local option budget supplements the district's general operating fund, which comes from the standard 20 mill state levy that has been part of the annual budget for at least the last five years, Selby said.

The 14.534 mills in the budget is an estimate, he said. The actual amount will be calculated as part of the school district's portion of the county's overall levy. in late October.

For last school year, the district called for 11.890 mills for the local option budget and the actual amount was 11.889. In 2002-2003, the district called for 14.663 and actually got 14.546.

The levy for the general operating fund and the local option budget, along with the standard 4 mills for capital outlay, make up the three parts of the school district's portion of the county levy. The composite levy also will include the property tax levies from the state, county, city and other agencies.

A resident's total tax bill will depend on which school, fire and library district he or she lives in, said county clerk Janet Rumpel. In addition, a few townships also will charge a levy.

A mill equates to \$1 for every \$1,000 of assessed value for taxable property. This includes real estate, mineral interests, state assessed utilities, and oil and gas royalties. Certain items of personal property, such as motor boats, golf carts and aircraft also are taxable. A list of these items is available at the county appraiser's office on the third floor of the Sherman County courthouse.

The school board's public hearing on the 2004-2005 school budget will be at noon today at the district office, 1312 Main Ave.
