## Assistant principal of schools was elected

#### By Evelyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society August 20, 1904: John Reed Elected — Chosen Assistant Principal of the Goodland Schools -John Reed, county superintendent of schools of this county, was elected Tuesday night to the assistant principalship of the Goodland schools, succeeding C.W. McCormick, who resigned to accept a position in Atwood.

A number of outside applicants were after the place, but the board of education thought the best man of all was our townsman, Mr. Reed, and he was elected without opposi-

Mr. Reed has lived in Sherman county for a long time. He is serving his second term as county superintendent and formerly taught in the city school. He is thoroughly competent to fill the position to which he has been elected.

August 21, 1904: Lives With Broken Neck — Dan Showalter, a young man of Colby who last week fell from a wagon loaded with salt, the wheels of which passed directly over the cervical vertebrae, breaking his neck, is alive in Christ's hospital, Topeka.



McClintlock, and it is thought by the hospital physicians that young Showalter has a good chance to recover, although at present his lower limbs are paralyzed. But paralysis by violent shock or injury often cures itself in time.

Accompanied by his two neighbor boys, Dan started out to his father's (Alex Showalter) ranch west of Colby. They were loaded with a thousand pounds of salt and expected to get there with a balky horse.

While crossing a draw, the team, now halting between two opinions, suddenly gave a lurch to one side, throwing Showalter from the wagon, and the wheels passed over his neck.

This step, though an expensive one, was thought to be necessary, as the large wooden tank has been pronounced unsafe, and the people have no desire to be caught with their water supply gone by collapsing of the tank.

The movement to make the needed improvement was started some time ago, and a petition signed by three fifths of the resident taxpayers of Goodland was presented to Mayor C.E. Swarts, asking that an election by proclamation be held to place the question before the qualified voters.

It is planned to erect a steel stand pipe 16 feet in diameter and 60 feet

high. Gasoline engines are being used with success in water works all over the country, and should the bond proposition carry, one will be put in here.

This is one of the municipal elections in Kansas which the women are not allowed to vote. Women may vote on a proposition to issue school bonds and for city and school district officers.

August 23, 1904: The "Colored Jubilee Singers" at the Opera House drew a big crowd the first night, but the second performance was pretty thinly attended. It was a secondclass entertainment, and most of the people were disappointed. Goodland people don't like to be "barn stormed" when they pay for something better.
