New way to process checks here to stay

Dear Attorney General Phill Kline:

My local bank recently informed me that beginning October 28, 2004, my canceled checks will no longer be returned to me. Is such practice an individual bank policy, or is this a nationwide trend?

Dear Kansas Consumer:

President George W. Bush signed The Check Clearing for the 21st Century Act, better known as Check 21, into law on Oct. 28, 2003. The Federal Reserve Bank began advocating for this legislation shortly after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001

Check 21 allows banks to process checks by scanning them with computers rather than by the now antiquated process of funneling the actual paper checks through the Federal Reserve. Under the now-out-



dated system, a business had to deposit their customer's check into their bank, which then sent that paper check to the Federal Reserve Bank in their district. The Federal Reserve then forwarded that same paper check onto the Federal Reserve Bank in the district where the electronically, Check 21 will encustomer's bank account was located. Then the final (often fourth) bank handling the check transferred the payment to the the system from the business payee's account.

Scanning technology renders this check transfer system essentially paperless. It speeds the process up. attorney general This improvement in the timing of the trans-

> actions causes some consumers grief since writing checks on an insufficient account. in hopes of beating the check back to the bank, is no longer an option.

> What that means for the conprocessed check will soon be behind us. Rather than travel through owner's bank to the customer's

bank and then back to the consumer, most checks are now shredded after they are "imaged", or turned into an electronic check by scanning. And what once took many days to process can now be completed in mere seconds over the Internet.

If you are still receiving copies of canceled checks that will most likely come to an end on or before Oct. 28. If you are now writing checks in hopes of putting the funds in the bank before the check clears, it is time to rethink that practice because the "floating period" you once enjoyed is quickly disappearıng

The new Check 21 law has more than a few consumer protections built in, many of which seek to solve the problems generated if and when checks are incorrectly processed. Any errors noted on your bank statement should be brought to the attention of the bank, in writing, in a timely fashion.

Though most new things take some getting used to, it is the hope of the federal government is Check 21 will provide better security and processing of your financial transactions.

The Goodland Star-News Four completed micro loans totaling \$55,000 have been completed in Sherman County, and Commissioner Kevin Rasure said at a meeting Tuesday that two applications should be ready to review before the program expires.

Micro loans have been made to help start or expand four businesses, Reynaldo's, Scooters, J&K Radiator and Sunflower Computer. Rasure said the two applications should be ready for review later this week.

The program began over two years ago when Sherman County received a grant for \$100,000 to provide micro loans of up to \$15,000 to small businesses. The grant is administered through the Northwest Kansas Planning and Development Commission out of Hill City, with \$10,000 to go for administrative costs.
