Speaker gave impetus to temperance work By Evelyn Ward tion of the entire state, as returned to the state board of agriculture by

Sherman County Historical Society August 27, 1904: Temperance work in Goodland received new inspiration and new impetus from the lectures of Miss Olive P. Blunt.

Miss Blunt is one of the state lecturers of the Kansas Women's Christian Temperance Union (W.C.T.U.) and did splendid work for the organization during her three days here. Then she gave three days each to Edson and Kanorado.

She organized a Loyal Temperance Legion of 67 members among the children. They made a public demonstration.

With Miss Blunt and three other ladies in a carriage to direct them, they marched up the Boulevard for three blocks, stopping two or three times to give the state yell: "Rah! Rah! Rah! Who are we? An L.T.L. don't you see. A sturdy Kansas L.T.L. Don't you love to hear us yell? Saloons must go, saloons must go. For we boys and girls say so."
