August 31, 1904: Amos Smith Leaves — Goes to Take Possession of His New Home Near Dighton, Lane County—Amos Smith, for 18 years a resident of Sherman county -except a short time when he went west discontented, but soon came back with a homelike feeling in his bosom and a glad look on his face -will go to Dighton, Lane County, this week to take possession of a 480-acre farm he recently purchased.

He sold his Sherman county farm several months ago, and two weeks ago he disposed of some of his stock at auction sale. He will ship 45 head of cattle to his Lane County farm.
