#### Assistant principal left for Atwood job today in history By Evelyn Ward Sherman County Historical Society

September 3, 1904: Prof C.W. McCormick left Wednesday morning for Colby and from there will take a stage for Atwood, where he will make his future home, as he has been elected principal of the Atwood high school. Mrs. Mc-Cormick and little child accompanied him.

Mr. McCormick was elected assistant principal of the Sherman county high school, but resigned to accept the Atwood school. He will have five teachers under him.

As an instructor, Prof. Mc-Cormick is well rated by those who know him best and by what the necessary qualifications are. He holds a state life certificate, and his personal self control and power to command respect among the students are exceptional.
