September 10, 1904: Boy Won't Tell — How Ira Peters, young son of R. L. Peters, threw his wrist out of joint and bruised his head so that he could hardly move it from the pillow the next day is a mystery to everyone except himself.

His parents believe he fell out of the hay mow, but the boy won't tell. Ira has been coaxed, but of no avail.

Influence has been brought to bear in the shape of cookies and crackers with jelly on them, but he keeps his own council as to how he got hurt.

Dr. Gulick was called to the Peters home, four miles north of town, to reduce the dislocation, and the boy is getting over his hurt.
