In the next match Hays beat Burlington 25-12, 25-20 to set up a match between the two remaining undefeated teams. The Lady Indians, who entered the meet 3-0 for the season, were able to pull away in the final points of what was a close contest to win the first game 25-20. In the second game with the score tied at 3 Hays was able to score six straight points then held off the Cowgirls through the rest of the game to win 25-18.
