The Goodland Star-News The Goodland Cowboys scored their first touchdown against St. ans at Cowboy Stadium.

On the their third play from scrimmage after the opening kickoff, the Indians fumbled the ball in the backfield. It was picked up by Cowboy junior Jase Herl, who returned it 14 yards for a touchdown. The extra point kick was wide, but Goodland led 6-0 less

than 90 seconds into the game.

In the second quarter, senior fullback Brock Lohr scored on a 5-yard run to cap a nine-play, 72-yard drive. The two-point conversion attempt failed, but the Cowboys' lead increased to 12-0. Less than 30 seconds later, the Indians responded with a 78-yard pass play from junior Dylan Loyd to sophomore Joel McAtee for a touchdown. Senior running back Derrick Ross ran the ball in for the two-point conversion to make the score 12-8.

Goodland increased its lead to 18-8 about halfway through the third quarter when senior quarterback Derrick Raymer led the Cowboys on a 13-play, 65-yard drive, sneak

In the fourth quarter, Goodland scored two more touchdowns. > Coach Jon McLean said he was pleased with the win, but noted that the team made mistakes, especially with turnovers and penal-

ties. He said the team did not play as well as it could have in the first half, but credits St. Francis for some of that.

The Cowboys outgained St. Francis by almost 100 yards, 284 to 188. Goodland rushed for 154 yards and passed for 130. The Indians gained 110 yards on the ground and 78 in the air. Goodland completed seven of nine third-down conversions compared to four of 14 for St. Francis.

Lohr led Goodland's ground attack, rushing for 98 yards on 22 carries scoring two touchdowns. Raymer ran eight times for 35 yards and a touchdown. Senior tailback Lane Winter gained 10 yards on six scoring on a 1-yard quarterback carries and Herl ran once for 14 vards.

He added that the special teams did particularly good job Friday, saying the kickoff team covered well and the punting team was solid.

The Cowboys were penalized 10 times for 124 yards. Junior running back Bobby Miller saw a 23-yard touchdown called back for an illegal block. St. Francis was flagged just four times for 25 yards.
