Powdery mildew runs rampant on cucumbers, melons, squash

A couple weeks ago I discussed powdery mildew on lilacs. Well now powdery mildew is in the garden in full force. About mid-August powdery mildew usually runs rampant on vine crops. Nearly all vine crops, including cucumbers, muskmelon, pumpkins and squash, are susceptible. Powdery mildew is not as common on watermelons. Mildew does not respond to many conventional fungicides. Control measures work best when the fungicide is applied as soon as the first small spots are visible. A severe mildew infestation is almost impossible to stop with fungicides available to homeowners. Mildew will prematurely defoliate plants but usually will not kill them. Yields can be reduced up to half by the loss of leaves, which exposes existing fruit to sunburn. Fungicide sprays need to be directed toward all leaf surfaces both upper and lower. This is difficult with vine crops, which have large leaves that grow flat to the ground. A fine mist with enough pressure to lift leaves or a spray wand directed up under plant leaves is essential for good control.

Alma Lorraine (Rena) Pickett, 81, St. Francis, a retired farmer, died Saturday, Sept. 4, 2004, at her home. Her health had been declining over the past few months.

She was born Nov. 12, 1922, at McDonald, the daughter of Charles E. and Alma Marie (Beckman) Knapp. On Dec. 18, 1942, she married Hook Pickett at Atwood. She contracted polio in September of 1946 after Hook had returned from serving in the Army in Europe during World War II.
Polio left her crippled in that she walked in a stooped fashion, but she did not like or accept sympathy. She worked long and hard to make certain she held up her end.
She was caring and kind to others and baked more cookies for the consumption of others than do

many cookie factories. She was able to make her own decisions and to live in her own home until the end.
Pickett accepted Christ as her Savior and spent her life doing what she could to perform her responsibilities to God and others. She was baptized by immersion as a public demonstration of her faith even though she was deathly afraid of water of any significant depth.
She had farmed in the Edson area since 1956 when in 1990 she moved to St. Francis, where she remained until her death.
Preceding her in death were her husband; her parents; four brothers,

Howard, Orville, Floyd and Charles; and a sister, Erma.
Survivors include a daughter, Marion (Larry) Crouse of Wichita; a son, Jim (Pat) Pickett of Nevada; a sister, Ann Ewing of St. Francis; four grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.
