saw the glitz and glamour along with the overpopulation and grime of New York City.

And they were there through terror alerts, high security and protests during the Republican National Convention.

Despite seeing the bad and the ugly, the 16year-old junior at Goodland High School enjoyed the good and found the downside of

the city worth braving to further his modeling career.

Actually, after a call from Chris's agent, the Baumfalk family hopped on a plane for one of the longest commutes in history, returning to New York for a photo shoot after Chris had been back for less than a week of school.

And so far their efforts are paying off. Chris will appear in the December issue of *Cosmopolitan* and in YM in December, January and next spring. And he narrowly missed an opportunity to hit the runway for Fashion Week.

Chris said he was on hold for Fashion Week, but the client decided to release him.

They were looking for really long hair, he said, scruffy beards and bone skinny.

"At my agency in New York," Chris said, "there are 60 other models I compete with for the same jobs. You never know what look they want.'

Age was also a factor for Fashion Week, he said, as the clients wanted 18 and 19-year-old models. He added most of his work would probably be for magazines and on the runway at fashion parties for the next couple of years.

But he's keeping plenty of irons in the fire. Chris said he had a summer

to clients, parties to show off clothing lines and castings, interviews to

see if clients want to hire him. He returned from New York last Thursday to start school and was planning to return to New York Monday, but the call from his agent got him and his parents on a plane Wednesday to be there at 8:30 a.m.

Chris expects to spend part of the winter in Miami, and he may have a future in Los Angeles and overseas as well. After two to three months in Miami, Chris said he will

check on things with Los Angeles. "I want to get into acting," he said; "modeling lasts only so long." But that will

be down the road. More modeling in Milan, London and Tokyo will probably come first, he

said. For now, he is happy to have his parents' support in launching his career.

"I'm really lucky to have parents that are willing to do this for me," he said. "Not every 16-year-old has parents who are willing to move to New York. They really believe in me.'

Chris said his work in New York included dressing up and going to parties, where he did a lot of handshaking and then took a turn on the runway to show off the clothes. He said he was paid \$500 for two hours' work at one party.

And his schmoozing included meeting celebrities. He said he met actress Gabrielle Union, who was in "She's All That" and "Bad Boys II," at an anniversary party for Gilla Roos Representatives.

But it wasn't all glamour. It looks easy, Chris said, but it's hard work.

He said some of the downsides of modeling are waiting around all day and wearing winter clothes on the roof during summer.

You have to get used to acting like a couple with a girl you just met, he said; it's not that easy.

Chris said when the family first went to New York, they stayed in a hotel a stone's throw from the Empire State Building. Now, he said, they rent a \$2,000 per month studio apartment across from the Trump Plaza.

"We could have found a cheaper place," he said, "but we felt safe there.'

New York at Nathan's Famous Hot Dogs on the boardwalk at Coney Island, a place known for hot-dog eating contests. Chris said they found that people in New York eat outdoors a lot; there are tables along a lot of streets. It's not so windy there, he said.

And he said it costs \$25-\$30 for a steak with no sides. They sometimes throw in a baked potato, he said. And Virgil commented that it's \$14 for a hamburger. But the food was really good, Chris said, not always fast-food like here.

Virgil spent part of the time in New York with Chris and then came back, being replaced by Jackie. The family came back, Chris said, to get ready for school. He said he will be doing a lot of school work over the Internet and by faxing because he will be gone most of the first semes-

But, he said, it will be as if he were in school here, so he can graduate with his class. Chris said he was glad to be back in Goodland because it's less crowded, and he could spend time with his friends. But he wasn't overly excited to go back to school.

"Well, you remember what it's like," he said.
