

Cowboys go hunting for third win of season

The Goodland Cowboys will be back on the trail today as they travel to Atwood for a buffalo hunt. Last year the Atwood Buffaloes led by all-everything Jeff Horinek and coached by Dan Lankas defeated Goodland 10-7 in overtime at Cowboy Stadium. However things are different this year. Last season both teams went into the game undefeated. While that is true for the Cowboys again this season, the Buffaloes have a 0-2 record going into tonight's game losing to Colby 34-14 on Sept. 3 and to Oakley 53-0 last Friday. For the first time in four years the Buffaloes are without the services of Horinek who played fullback on offense, linebacker on defense and did the place-kicking. Horinek is now a freshman at Colorado State University at Fort Collins. Like Goodland, Atwood has a new head coach. Former Buffalo Coach Dan Lankas, who was inducted into the Kansas State Uni-

versity Athletic Hall of Fame this year, retired from coaching. Coach Jared Wigger now has the challenge of continuing the Buffaloes success. Even the school has a new name, on July 1 Atwood High School became Rawlins County High School because of the closing of the school in Herndon. Although the Cowboys have enjoyed much greater success than the Buffaloes the first two weeks of the season Coach Jon McLean is not taking tonight's game lightly. McLean said over confidence is a concern, he fears that some players may look at the Buffaloes record and take the game lightly. "The Atwood kids are not going to lay down for us," he said. "We're still going to have to block and tackle out on the field to get the job done." McLean emphasized the need for the Cowboys to execute on offense, and to cut down on the penalties and

turnovers. Atwood will try and confuse Goodland's defense with a lot of spread formations and motion, McLean said, for which the Cowboys worked hard this week to be prepared for. Offensively the Cowboys are led by senior fullback Brock Lohr who has rushed for 191 yards on 41 carries scoring five touchdowns. Senior tailback Lane Winter has 180 yards on 19 carries and one touchdown. Senior quarterback Derrick Raymer has completed 10 of 17 passes for 172 yards. One of which went 20 yards to senior tight end Bret Jarmin for a touchdown last Friday against St. Francis. Raymer has rushed 22 times for 138 yards and ran for three touchdowns. Junior Jase Herl is leading the team in receptions so far this season with four for 62 yards. Herl is the team's leader in tackles with 19 and has a fumble recovery for a touchdown.

Golf team wins Hays tourney

The Goodland Cowgirls golf team won their second tournament of the season Monday at the Smoky Hill Country Club in Hays. The Cowgirls had two players in the top 10. Freshman Sammie Raymer led the team placing third overall with a 102 for 18 holes. Senior Amy Cebula was sixth with 108. Other top scorers were junior Sami Philbrick with 119 and sophomore Hannah Burkett with 121. Seniors Kelsey Leiker and Emily Burkett shot a 124 and 128 respectively. "Our girls did a super job Monday," said coach Connie Livengood. "This was the first time we won the tournament in Hays and I was really excited about that." The Cowgirls' score of 450 was just one stroke better than the team from Trego Community High School in WaKeeney. The Golden

Eagles had three players in the top 10. Bailey Ponton of Minneapolis High was the individual champion with a 18-over-par 90. Kristen Woods of Larned was second with 96. Minneapolis finished third with 458. Larned was fourth, Bennington fifth, Hays sixth, Thomas More Prep-Marian seventh and Scott City eighth. Russell had three players playing in the tournament, however four are needed for a team score. There were 43 golfers competing. The Cowgirls have won two of the three tournaments they played in so far this season and finished second at the other. Livengood said some of the older players at times are not satisfied with how they did which she said is good because it means they want to become better and has made them


more competitive. Livengood said she is splitting up the team Monday into two varsity squads sending one to the tournament in Colby and the other to one in Russell. The rest of the players were to have played at a tournament in Ulysses Thursday. She said all players on this year's roster will get to play in a tournament between Thursday and Monday. "It will be great experience for our golfers to play at the different courses and competition," Livengood said. The Colby Country Club is north of the city on Country Club Drive. Tee-off is at 3 p.m. (Central Time). "We know we have to get even better though," Livengood said, "we need to just keep on working to achieve the goal we want to accomplish."

Brewster loses dogfight, 80-44

The Brewster High football team was handed its first defeat of the year at the hands of the Ingalls Bulldogs in a 80-44 whipping Friday night. Brewster dug an early hole in the road game when the team was unable to move the ball on the first possession. Ingalls took the ball at their own 27 and ground down 10 plays and nearly four minutes for their first touchdown with 6:18 left in the quarter. The pattern would repeat itself twice more before the quarter would end with Ingalls leading 22-0. Ingalls made two 2-point conversions. Brewster, however, was not finished. When the second quarter began, they were on the Ingalls 39 with a first and 10. Quarterback Branson Gilley found Josh Ryan for 39 yards and Brewster's first score. Gilley's extra-point toss was caught by Heath Baird and Brewster had cut the deficit to 22-8 only eight seconds into the second quarter. Ingalls' next drive took them 20 yards before Baird intercepted a Chad Gerber pass intended for Cody Meeks and Brewster took over on their 11. The Ingalls defense stopped Brewster cold, forcing a rare bad punt from Baird, and that Ingalls the ball on the Brewster 19. Two plays later, Gerber went into the end zone. Kyle O'Connor intercepted the 2-point conversion and Ingalls led 28-8 with 7:56 left in the half. The rest of the half was a scoring clinic, with Brewster scoring four more touchdowns and Ingalls adding one. Brewster took over and fumbled on the first play, but Jake Long recovered. On second and 15, Gilley aired things out to O'Connor for 49 yards and a touchdown. The 2-point conversion failed, but Brewster had cut the deficit to 28-14 with 7:03 left in the half. Ingalls came right back on a four-play drive culminating in a 32-yard touchdown run by Gerber. The conversion failed and Ingalls led 34-14 at the 5:49 mark. Brewster responded with a four-play drive of their own ending in a 34-yard touchdown pass from Gilley

to Baird. Gilley was sacked on the conversion and Brewster trailed 34-20 with 5:06 left in the half. Ingalls added its last touchdown of the half on the next drive. With 3:55 left in the half, Gerber rambled for 39 yards and ran the conversion in to give Ingalls a 42-20 lead. Brewster would score twice more in the half. The first was a 34-yard pass from Gilley to O'Connor with 1:31 left and the second was set up after Ingalls was forced to punt for the first time. Gilley ran the kick back to the Ingalls 10, then found Baird open in the endzone with only 44 seconds on the clock. Both conversions failed and Ingalls was unable to score on their last possession. Brewster trailed 42-32 at half-time. Brewster pinned Ingalls back at their 12 to start the second half, but they responded with a three-play drive, including a 61-yard touchdown run by Gerber. The conversion failed again and Ingalls led 48-32 with 10:35 left in the third quarter. Ingalls recovered a Gilley fumble on the next drive and ran it back to the Brewster six, setting up another Gerber touchdown and failed conversion for a 54-32 Ingalls lead with 8:14 left in the quarter. Both teams were forced to punt on the ensuing drives until Ingalls took over with 4:47 left in the third on their 25. Eight plays later, Gerber scored a 10-yard touchdown with 1:46 left and Cody Waggoner scored the conversion to put Ingalls up 62-32, where the quarter would end. Ingalls added another Gerber touchdown with 11:32 in the fourth to make the score 68-32. Long scored on an 11-yard run with 11:01, then Brewster recovered a fumble deep in Ingalls territory and Gilley again went to Baird for a seven-yard pass into the end zone. The conversion failed and Brewster trailed 68-44 with 8:37 left. Ingalls added the last two scores of the game. The first was a 19-yard pass from Gerber to Keith VenJohn with 4:32 left, and the last was a 28-yard run by Nathan Wendel with 1:33 showing on the clock. Both conversions failed. Brewster had 50 yards on the

ground and 300 in the air. Gilley went 13-for-31 with two interceptions and six touchdowns. Baird went 0-for-1 on a failed fake punt. Baird had eight catches for 152 yards and three touchdowns. O'Connor had three catches for 104 yards and two touchdowns. Ryan had one catch for a 39-yard touchdown. Long had one catch for five yards. Gilley had 13 carries for 34 yards. Long had six carries for 23 yards and a touchdown. O'Connor had one carry for -7 yards. Baird averaged 27 yards per punt on three tries. Long had 18 tackles and six assists. O'Connor had seven tackles, five assists and an interception. Baird had six tackles and an interception. Garret Smith had five tackles and an assist. Paul Flanders had five tackles and five assists. Josh Ryan had four tackles and two assists. Gilley had four tackles and three assists. Cory Grantz had three tackles. Tyler Johnson had a tackle and an assist. Brewster is off this week. They travel to Tribune on Friday, Sept. 24, for a 7:30 p.m. game (Central Time).
